Residents Object to Gravel Pit Site

A two-day hearing on the operation of a gravel pit near Terra Cotta by Consolidated Sand & Gravel was held last week in Toronto.

A recommendation from Mines Commissioner J. H. McFarland to Mines Minister Leo Bernier was promised within 30 days.

The company's general manager maintained that the gravel pit will not reduce the attractiveness of the area, nor interfere with wildlife. There will be noise from a crushing machine, he said, but this is a necessary part of the operation.

Gas Bar, Car Wash Planned on Highway

A new gas bar and automatic car wash is planned on Guelph Street across from Georgetown Market Centre.

Gordon Sleeman, who plans the new business, told council Monday it would be constructed on land adjoining the William McDonald home on the north side of the highway. He said his equipment would be the most modern available, and able to wash a car in one minute and 40 seconds.

Water and sewer service is not available in the location, and he

said his plans are dependent on obtaining this.

BUDGET It would cost about \$14,000 to extend these services along the highway as far as C&V Motors, the town engineer estimates, and Reeve Ric Morrow said there is no allocation in this year's budget for this.

Mr. Sleeman said he would be prepared to foot the bill for this for the present, if some of the cost could be recovered by him later.

He was promised a decision on services within a few weeks.

Will Have Board But No Library

Esquesing township will have its own library board, but no library building, as soon as four members can be appointed, by Esquesing council.

A by-law to establish a public library was passed at Esquesing council meeting, Monday night. This step and the setting up of the board is mandatory in order for the township to collect a 65c per capita grant for libraries.

Where a township has no building of its own, they may subcontract the library service to neighbouring towns, in this case, Acton, Georgetown and Milton. The Esquesing Library Board, when it is set up, will distribute the money to the three boards, probably in ratio to the number of users of each library, or on some other basis.

Esquesing council would like some help in appointing the members, and are asking anyone interested to call them.

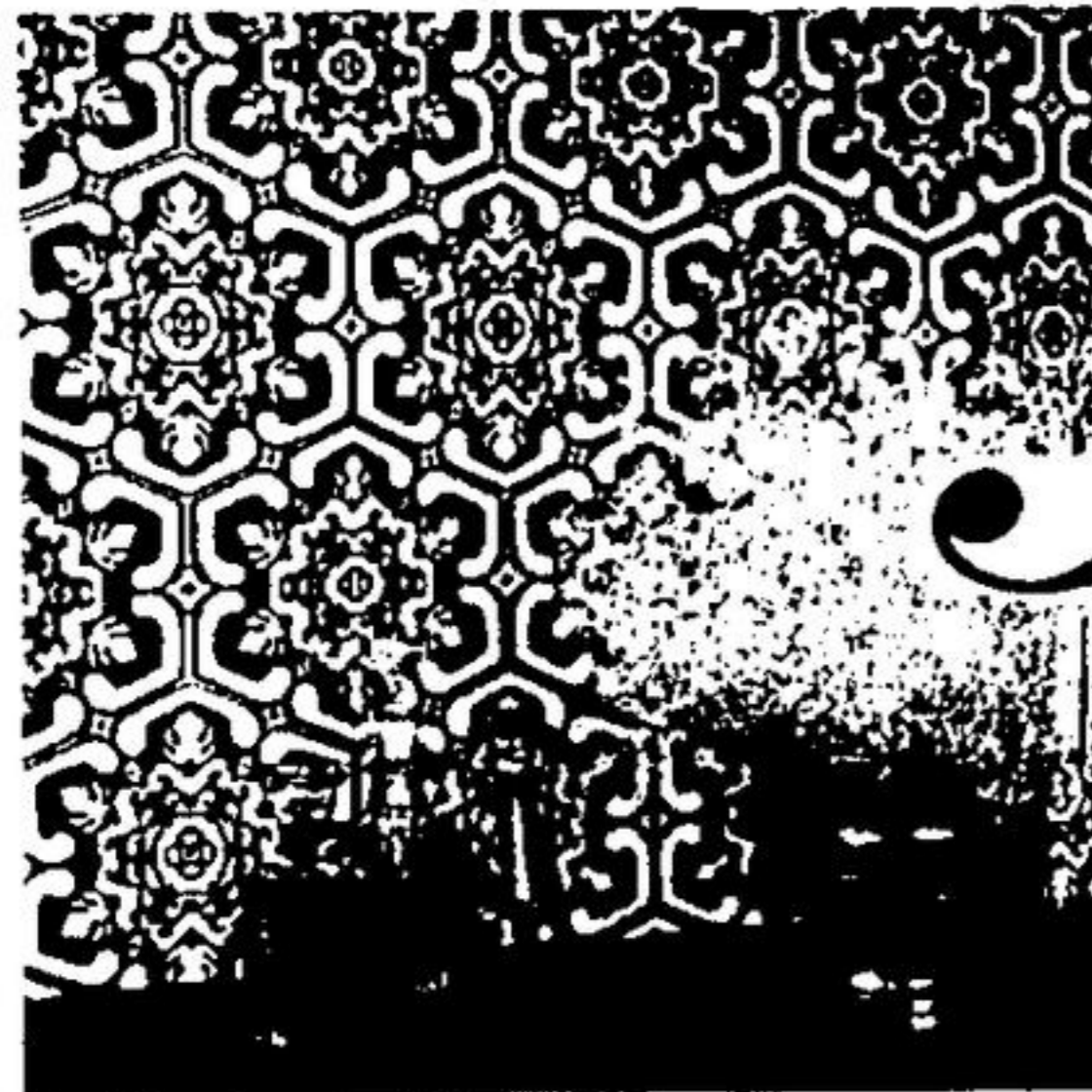
Both Mr. Thomas and Miss Lee are missionaries of the Christian and Missionary Alliance.
