Barreling Buggy Wins First Downhill Derby

Crowds lined both sides of Maple Avenue's east hill Sunday afternoon to watch the first annual Grand Prix for Soap Box Cars, an event for coaster drivers organized by the G.T. Motor Sports Club in cooperation with the G.R.C.

The races were open to children aged seven to fifteen, and 38 entries made it one of the largest soap box events in the province.

"Several other entrants regrettably had to be turned away because their cars did not meet specifications, but we are hoping they will try again next year," a G. T. Motor Sports Club spokesman told The Herald.

The hill was ideal, a long slope with a good upgrade runout at the bottom. The fastest racer averaged 16 miles per hour, the slowest 5 1/2 miles per hour - and the competition in between was fierce.

FIRST OVER ALL
Rob Freestone in his black barreling baby buggy was first over all and Senior Class B winner. Brad Knight won Senior Class A, Tom Wolfe Junior Class B, and Jeanne Wilson Junior Class A. Greg Morton was winner of the Most Deserving trophy, and Linda Broadfield, Best Appearance.

There were tears of disappointment after much expended effort, happy faces at the winning of a heat, sportsmanship demonstrated by one racer helping a competitor fix his car, people "just passing through" who wound up helping the organizers, and spectators whose hearts were with the young pilots, especially the slower ones, on every down hill run.

A young spectator was hit by a car which went out of control and over a bank in the day's only accident. Eleven year old Gary Nickerson of Garnet Drive suffered a leg cut that required stitches.

The organizers told The Herald they learned much about the staging of such an event, and with the experience, "hindsight"

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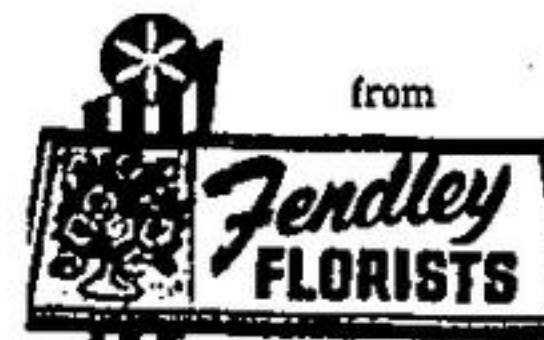
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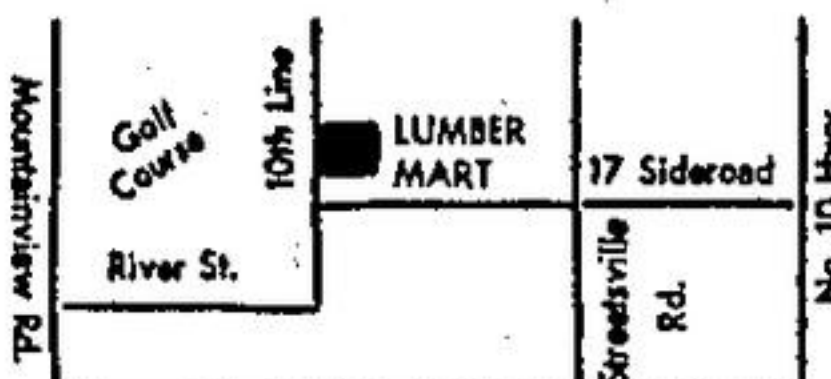
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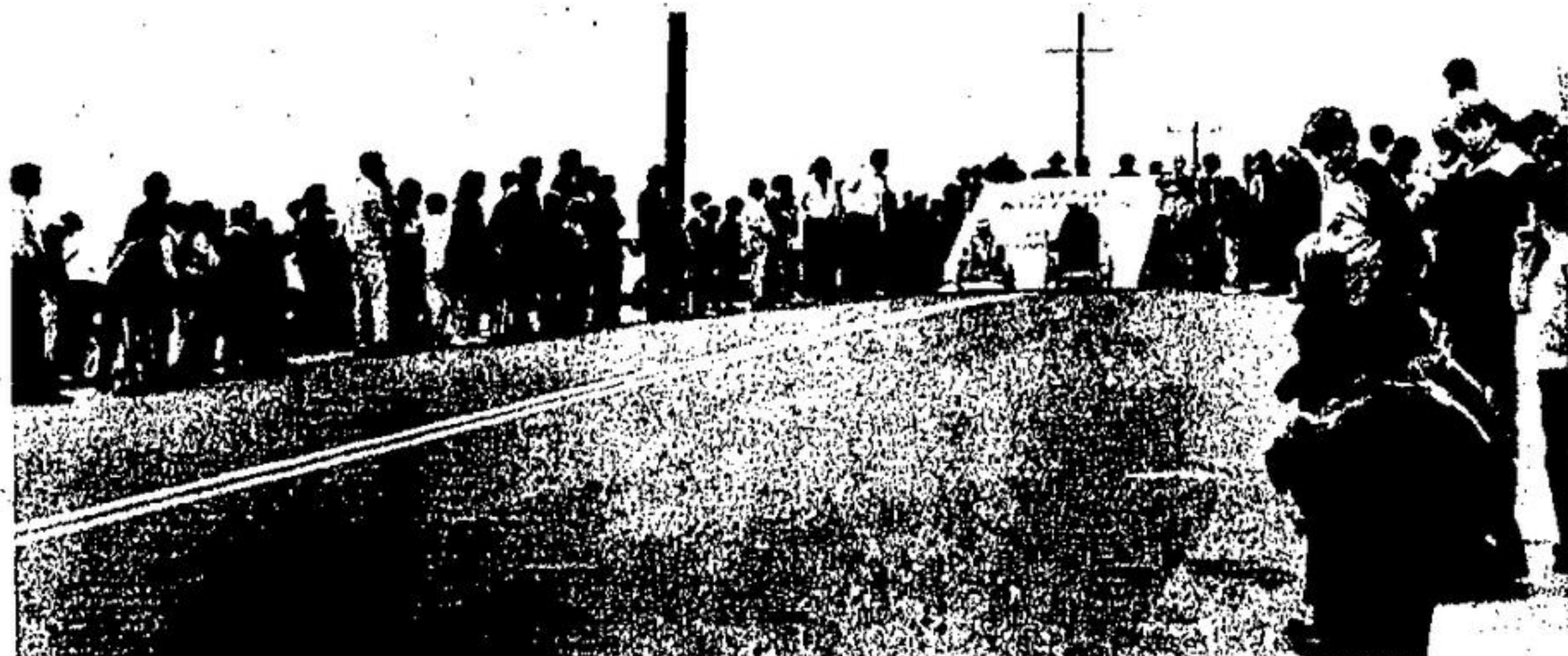
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Spectators line Maple Avenue as two soap box pilots are launched down the starting ramp.
