Tri-County Hockey Group Oppose 'First Year' Plan

An O.M.H.A. executive proposal that a minor and major series be introduced in all age groups but juvenile this season, is expected to meet stiff opposition, especially from Tri-County member towns, at the O.M.H.A. annual meeting in Toronto, Saturday, October 16. Tri-County president Bill

Rowney delegated a committee Sunday to investigate methods of defeating the proposal.

The O.M.H.A. proposal would permit minor teams in each age group to use first year players only. Major teams would be able to use first or second year players, but there would be no transfer of players from one team to the other during the season, as there has been in the past under the first and second team set-up. Provincial championships would be held in all major and minor series. Because of the small number of players registered in juvenile, no minor series is proposed in that age bracket.

JUST THREE GROUPS
Only teams in the "AAA", "AA" and "A" series of the O.M.H.A. would be affected by the proposal. Teams in the "B" series and lower would still be allowed to use first or second year players on their second teams, but no provincial championships will be held for second teams.

An amendment to the Tri-County constitution made at last year's annual meeting, restricts second teams in the "AAA" category only, to the use of first year players.

LONE DISSENTER
President Rowney pointed out Tri-County convener Jim Kinkley, who is also O.M.H.A. second vice-president, cast the lone dissenting vote, when the O.M.H.A. executive came up with the proposal.

Town reps voted unanimously to allow Preston teams to play four point games against each of the other 10 towns. Preston Arena was destroyed by fire last spring and the unfortunate result is the teams from that town will play only away games this year. The league schedule will probably start, Sunday, October 17.

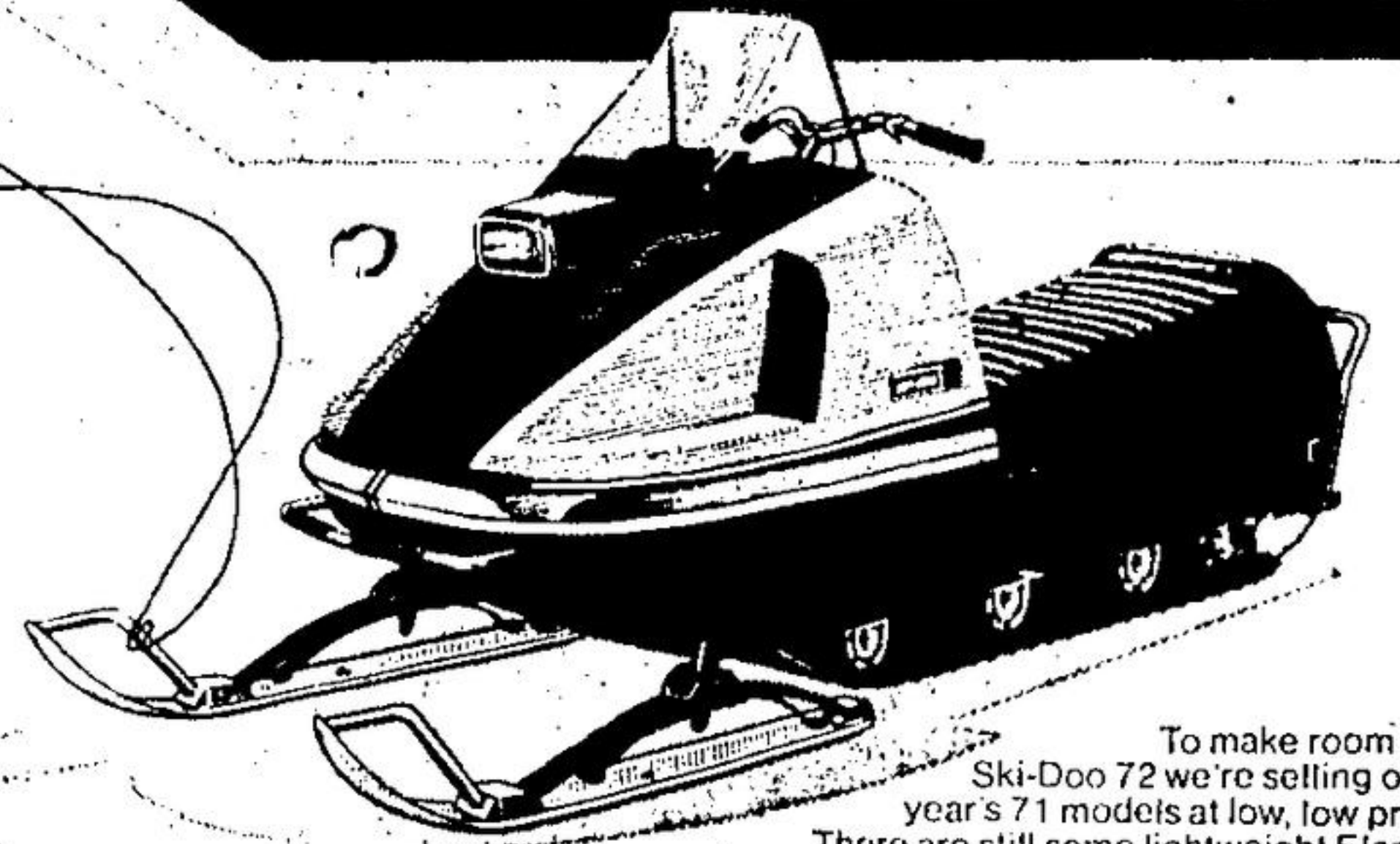
