 Insp. Blucher said that Constable Crawford was responding to an emergency call when the accident occurred.

Skid marks on the road indicated that the cruiser skidded across the median and came to rest against the southeast portion of the curb. The other car stopped on the southwest portion of Highway 10 near the median. Mr. DeGuise was reportedly thrown some 40 feet from the vehicle. After impact, the victim was thrown through the passenger door.

Insp. Blucher said this week that Constable Crawford has not been suspended from duty. "We work on the assumption that a man is innocent until proven guilty," he said.

Insp. Blucher did say, however, that nobody is allowed to travel through a red light. "What is accepted is any police car or emergency vehicle stops before entering an intersection and then proceeds with caution when the way is clear but by law there is no provision for this in the Highway Traffic Act."

According to the inspector, Constable Crawford was answering a blood emergency when the accident occurred.

"He was rendezvousing with another car that was carrying the blood," said Insp. Blucher. "The blood escort was described as an extreme emergency by the Red Cross Blood Bank. I understand it was going to the Central Grey Hospital in Markdale, just a few miles northwest of Shelburne."

Favour Estate Development
 An estate development of \$70,000 homes on over two acre lots was proposed to Esquing council, Monday night, by Cameron Heights Developments Ltd. The area to be developed consists of 43.85 acres, on Highway 25 four miles north of Highway 401, off St. Helena's Road. A. Boyd of Cameron Developments told council some of the 15 lots would be 3½ acres, all heavily wooded with birch and maple. Each house plan would have to be approved by the developers, and each would have individual wells and septic tanks. Reeve Tom Hill observed that the whole concept coincided with the official plan. Council members reacted favourably to the scheme, but the reeve warned they could do nothing until the official plan is approved.
