



Cr. Harry Levy has initiated action to change Georgetown street names which conflict.

At his suggestion, a council sub-committee will be set up to recommend changes.

He told a council committee meeting Monday that there is confusion in streets like Victoria Street and Victoria Avenue in different parts of town and in streets designated east and west which do not run in those directions.

Possibility of including historical references in new street names was also mentioned by Cr. Joan Smith.
