Any complaint with respect to an assessment on the assessment roll may be brought to the Assessment Review Court pursuant to section 52 of The Assessment Act, R.S.O. 1970, c.32 as amended by section 10 of The Assessment Amendment Act, 1971.

Notices of Complaint must be made in writing either by letter or on forms available at the Municipal Offices.

For purposes of identification, please include your name and postal address, and the reason(s) for complaint. If possible, note also the assessment roll number, the street address, concession and lot numbers, and the municipality in which the property under complaint is situated.

Any Notice of Complaint shall be malled by ordinary mall to the Regional Registrar named below, and, in addition, by registered mail to any person whose assessment is complained of, not later than the 31st day of October, 1971.
