### Write to Minister

#### School Board Wants Change in Grant

The Halton County Board of Education has written to Ontario education minister Robert Welch recommending changes in the provincial legislative grants to school boards.

A paragraph in the department of education's memorandum on payment of 1971 legislative grants aroused the Halton Board's concern.

**HOLD FIVE**  
It states that the province will pay school boards 95 per cent of grants owing during the calendar year and retain five per cent until a reconciliation has been made in the following year.

The five per cent is to be paid "as soon as possible after receipt of the 1970 financial statements and verification of the 1970 grant."

**COMPLAINT**  
The Halton board complains that the net effect "is that the department of education held \$1,110,061 which was owed (the board) for 1970 grants until July 22, 1971. The Halton County financial statements for 1970 were forwarded to the department well within the time limit." The board letter said "the
