# Promise Bowlers Relief From Floods

Relief for a flooding condition which plagues Georgetown Lawn Bowling Club each spring, was promised at a council meeting Thursday.

The club's property on Edith Street is in an area where major improvements to storm sewers are planned in future.

Town engineer Eric Willis was empowered to take whatever measures necessary to correct the flooding, and if possible tie this into the master plan.

**DIFFICULT**  
But Mr. Willis indicated that this would be difficult, as the major plan must start in the Princess Ann area and work from there. He estimates this in the region of \$100,000.

Temporary improvement could be obtained for the bowling club by spending up to \$2,000, road chairman Harry Levy said.

Cr. Ern Hyde said he would rather see something permanent, even if the cost were higher. And Cr. Ernest Sykes wanted a report from the engineer before any action is taken.

**NOT DEEP**  
Mr. Willis said catch basins in the area aren't deep enough to tie into any future system and indicated that anything done would be only of a temporary nature.

Cr. Sykes voted against the motion, saying a report would be fair to council and to the engineer before proceeding.

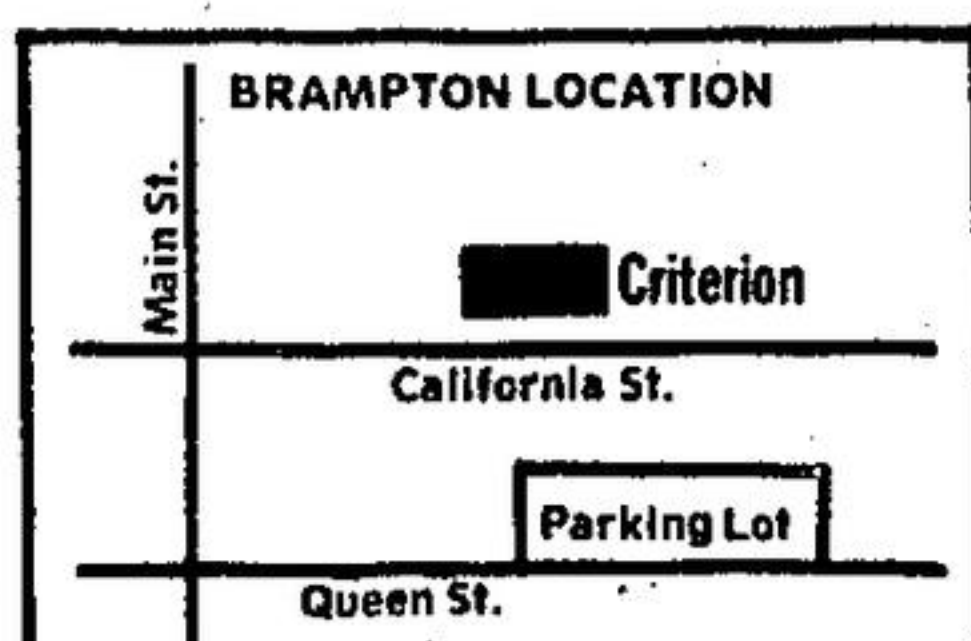
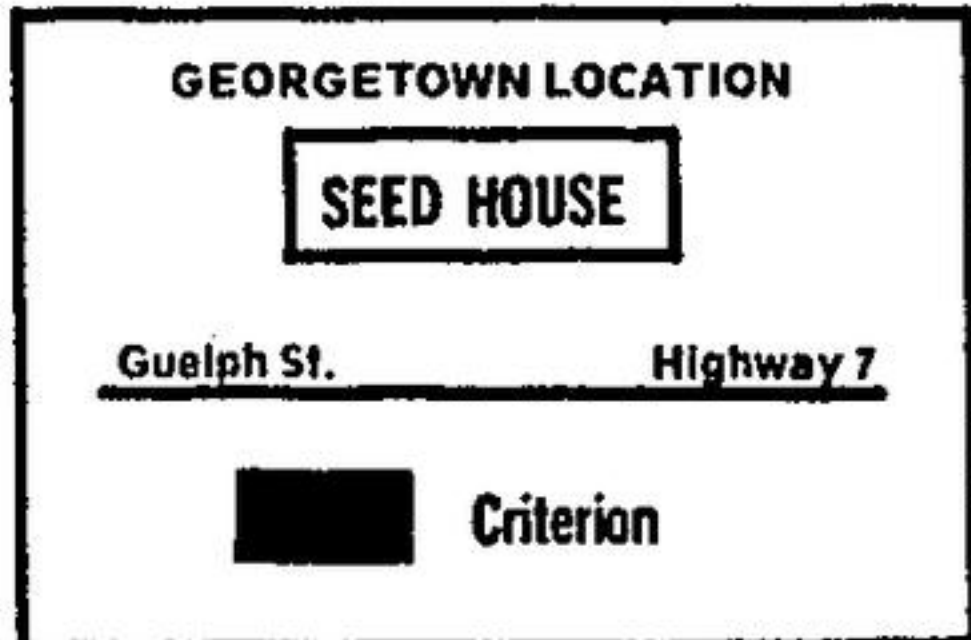
