

## Three From Georgetown Attend Iceland Conference

Reykjavik, Iceland was the scene of the Bahai North Atlantic Oceanic Conference, recently when 750 Bahais from 36 countries in attendance. Among the 200 Canadians were many from this area, including Mrs. Davina Barber, Mrs. Muriel Barr, Mrs. Lena Emmerson, all from Georgetown, Wayne Miller from Terra Cotta, Ivy Clark from Brampton, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Stanin of Erin and Mrs. and Mrs. Don Miller formerly of

Georgetown and now from the North West Territories. The group toured Reykjavik, a city of 80,000 people, with houses and large swimming pools heated by the underground springs. They saw the museum which has preserved the history of Iceland, and met sculptor and writer Asmundur Sveinsson. They also visited Gullgoss, the Golden Waterfalls, where the water comes from a great glacier, visible in the distance. The hot water geysers and green

houses heated by them, was another stop in the tour. Volcanoes extinct and otherwise were visible. The last eruption on the island was as late as 1970. A fact which surprised the visitors was the guide's statement that he had never known the temperature to go below freezing in the capital. While this conference was in progress for the North Atlantic Regions, a similar conference was being held in Sapporo, Japan.

### What They're Saying



**JIM SNOW (PC)** - "Voters have the choice in this campaign to move ahead with the Tories, surrender to socialism under the NDP, or slide into disorganization and confusion with the Liberals." - Oakville Meet The Candidates night, Sept. 28. **RICHARD MCGRATH (Independent)** - "Essentially the reason I am running is that the party system has proved defunct in Canada. I feel the only way to rejuvenate parliamentary democracy or to get back power to the people is to run independent candidates. "I think I am offering a legitimate alternative to the platforms of the parties. "My platform came down to a few general issues like getting away from bureaucracies and Canadian control of our own economy." - Interview.



**BOB BLAKE (Lib)** - "A provincial Liberal government's program of decentralization would mean transfer of about \$10 million to Halton County from provincial sources over the next four years. Decentralization and increased local autonomy are the only realistic courses for the next Ontario government. A Liberal government would assume 80 percent of education costs over the next four years, and a Liberal government would make unconditional grants to local municipalities." - Fund raising dinner at Holiday Inn. "The present Ontario government is like a house with many rooms, doors leading nowhere and unnecessary new wings under construction - a house with too many garages and not enough bedrooms - a house that badly needs a blueprint, not more carpenters." - Real Estate Board luncheon. "Education in Ontario must become more responsive to the people it serves, and more responsible to the people who pay for it. A Liberal government would phase out grade 13 from Ontario's high schools. It is a waste of student time, teacher time and much needed classrooms and tax dollars." - Knights of Columbus candidates meeting, Oakville.
