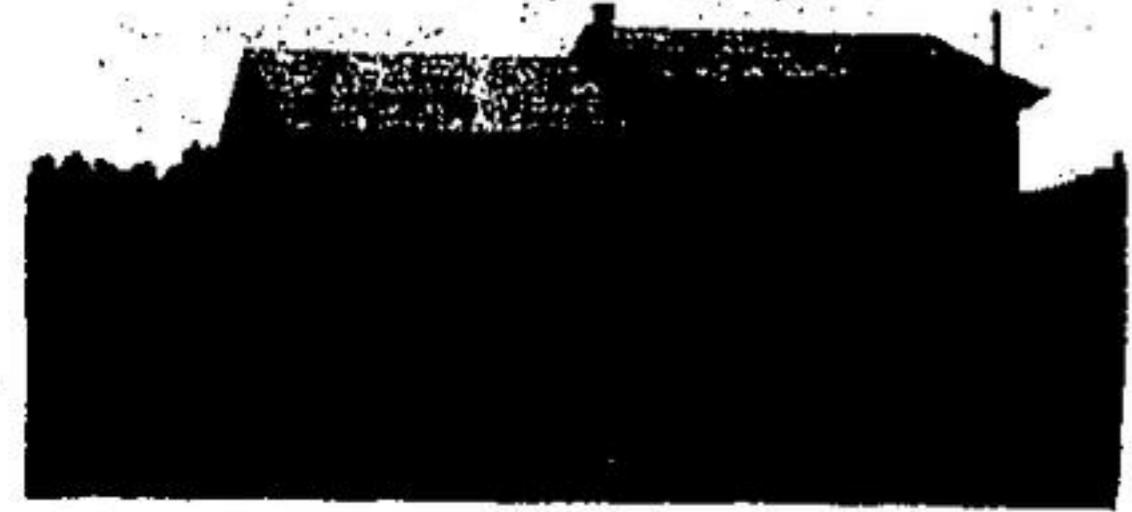

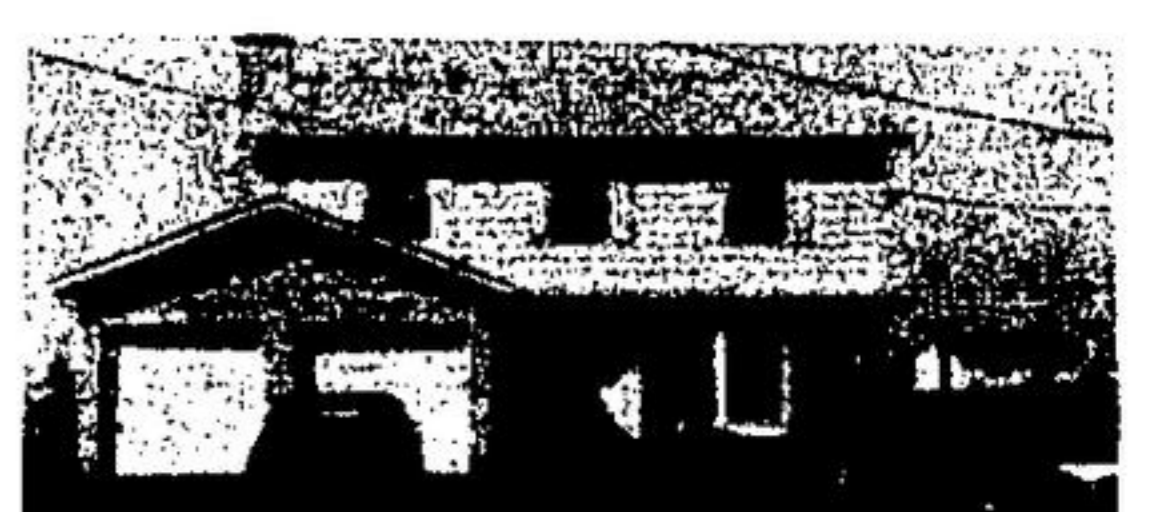

Mets-Rockwood Final Tied at Game Apiece

Norval Met pitcher John Holby gave as good as he got in Rockwood, Thursday.
In the second game of the Intercounty Football League (finals) Holby scattered four Rockwood hits, but hit in four trips to the plate to lead Norval to a 4-1 victory.
The win tied the best four out of seven set at a game apiece.
Norval's runs came hard.
Ray Inglis scored the first run on a Holby hit in the opening inning. In the third, Wayne King reached first safely on an error, advanced on a walk and another ball, and then scored on a passed ball.

MINIMUM TEAM
Mets went into a 3-0 lead in the fifth when Bill Sykes' double pushed Inglis home, and run four came in the 7th when Robinson scored on Holby's double.
Norval managed the win with a minimum nine players. To field a full team they needed a quick run to London on afternoon of the game to bring Greg Moody home from university.
Rockwood grabbed the opening game 5-3 even though Norval started like they intended to run the visitors out of the Glen park.
The Norvals jumped on John Salmon's offerings for three runs in the first inning, but the Rockwood twirler cut them off there, and allowed only one more hit in the ball game for a total of four.

TREATH
The Mets appeared ready to

fish it out in the ninth inning when they filled the bases with none out, but Salmon settled down to fan the next two batters, and then Paul Robinson's long poke to the deep outfield went for the third out.
Those three Met runs were produced when Robinson walked, Holby singled, Sykes reached first on a miscue and Jason Field slammed a three-bagger.
Rockwood counted two runs in the fourth, two more in the fifth, and one in the seventh. Five Norval errors contributed to the Rockwood total.
A game set for last Sunday was not played because of another commitment by the Rockwood club.

Resident Complains Of Pig Slaughtering

Complaining that a neighbour had slaughtered a pig and prepared the smoked meat in his garden, E. H. W. Ellis, 13 Hewson Crescent, presented a petition which had been signed by 11 residents to council at their Monday meeting.
Mr. Ellis said he had informed the health inspector and was told that an investigation showed no sign of this, and that he had been told by the police department that an offender must be caught "red-handed".

DENIED PERMIT
Mr. Ellis also queried why an area resident had been denied a permit to create a basement apartment when there are 16

people living in one six room house nearby.

Cr. Ern Hyde told him that an R.3 area allows only single family dwellings and that any apartments created have been done without knowledge of the building inspection department.

PROTECTION
He said there is protection against slaughtering animals, and that he will look into this, with hopes that it will not happen again.

Cr. Harry Levy assured Mr. Ellis that, with reassessment taking place, any basement apartments not presently being taxed, will be in future.

OUTDOORS by George Hoare

Table of Extinct, Rare and Endangered Vertebrates in Ontario

EXTINCT BIRDS
PASSENGER PIGEON.
Last flock in Ontario, 1884. Last specimen taken in wild, 1900. Last living individual known died in captivity in Cincinnati Zoological Gardens, Cincinnati, Ohio, September 1, 1914.

WILD TURKEY
Last specimen taken in Ontario, 1904. A few local attempts to re-introduce but with limited chance of success due to lack of availability of suitable habitat. Elsewhere in North America, many huntable populations remain.

REPTILES
TIMBER RATTLESNAKE.
Last one positively identified was captured at Niagara Glen in 1941.

MAMMALS
PUMA.
Never very common. Infrequent and as yet unauthenticated reports from North Bay, White River and Kenora areas. Last Ontario specimen prior to 1908.

BIRDS
PEREGRINE FALCON.
No known eyries in Ontario.

BALD EAGLE
Still a common nesting species in northwestern Ontario but with reduced nesting success and high levels of insecticide residues in eggs.

OSPREY
Similar status to bald eagle.
PRAIRIE CHICKEN
No pure prairie chicken remain. Many hybrids (sharp-tailed grouse and prairie chicken occur on Manitoulin Island).
More about reptiles and snakes in a later column.

MAPS
For information regarding a certain part of Ontario or any other province it's best to write to the Department of Lands and Forests and ask for the latest map showing the counties and townships. The cost is probably about 4 or 5 dollars but it's well worth the price.
For example the Northern part of Ontario is on a separate map to the Southern part.
They are large maps and from them one can pick out an area and order smaller maps of a bigger scale. They are quite helpful when one is interested in certain lakes or places to build a cottage.
Information is also available on fish stocking programs for certain townships.
The Dept. of Lands and Forests is always very glad to help.

RAINBOWS AND COHO'S
These species are reported to be in the rivers now, and many anglers are using very method to latch on to that trophy.
Some use roe, others worms, spinners wobblers and fly tackle. A floating fly line with a sinking tip, or a plain sinking line.

Bridge Reconstruction Strands School Pupils

At press time Esqueving Township workmen were still working on installing an emergency detour to take light traffic over the Credit River at the 10th Line, east of Glen Williams.
Esqueving Reeve Tom Hill told a delegation from the area at Monday night's council meeting he would put the crew right on it and attempt to have a river crossing usable by Tuesday night.
The decision to concentrate men and effort on constructing the crossing came after Gerry Inglis, spokesman for the delegation, told of hardships created by reconstruction of the 10th Line bridge which has temporarily put the bridge out of service.
TERRIFIED
One of the most concerned members of the delegation was Max Stafford. He told council his six year old daughter was

dropped off near the south side of the bridge by the school bus and then became terrified when she discovered there was no crossing. The Stafford home is a few hundred yards up the road on the north side.
The child was finally noticed by her grandmother who lives nearby and helped over the super-structure to the other side.
An older sister, arriving on another school bus, had to wade the river to get home. A third, was noticed by workmen on the bridge and aided over what was left of the bridge floor.
SOLUTION
Reeve Hill said he enlisted the co-operation of Sheridan Nurseries after he learned of trouble late Monday afternoon, and was working on a solution before the Monday night council meeting. A Sheridan Nurseries road will form part of the emergency detour and crossing being built
