Sports

Chairman Collison said he hoped the association would affiliate with the Parks and Recreation Committee, so the staff would be available for help. He suggested a member of the staff be a non-voting member of the hockey association.

He said the rates for ice time would be \$15 per hour after 9 a.m. and \$7.50 before that. The town would grant back \$1 per boy for each boy registered. "We hope to break even" he added.

SHORTER
Collison said the Recreation Committee were only suggesting the money be raised through charging the boys an increased registration fee of \$3.50 this year. He emphasized that there would only be 20 weeks this year, since the league could not start till October 30, at the earliest, and three Saturdays were already committed, another two Saturdays were Christmas and New Year's.

He suggested equipment costs would be covered by fund raising, but admitted the committee might have to help out this year, due to the lateness of the season, but said in future years, this would be the association's own responsibility.

STRUCTURE
In answer to a question, Collison stated, he hoped that last year's coaches would coach again this year, and preferably continue with the same teams. "We are not trying to change the organizational structure at all, since it was very sound".

"What about the kids in Esquing?", asked another voice from the floor. Collison replied that Georgetown boys would have to get preference, if a maximum number was set. "The reason behind this is simply that the Georgetown taxpayer is still subsidizing, and until now Esquing haven't offered any money".

Another member of the audience pointed out many of the coaches and referees were from Esquing. "Are you going to shut them out too?" he asked. Collison replied that he hoped no-one would have to be shut out, but if a cut-off point had to be established it would probably be Georgetown boys first.

UNEAI
Bill Richmond contended it was unfair to take Saturdays away from the kids for other events. "We're all for the skating carnival, but when they take a Saturday, they should give the kids their Mondays and Tuesdays".

To another question, Collison said the total cost of ice was \$21.50 an hour, and the figure skating club paid exactly the same as being asked of the hockey association, \$15 an hour after 9 a.m.

A lady pointed out that in other areas the charge was as high as \$25 an hour to hockey groups.

Following a half hour discussion in small groups, spokesmen for the groups raised points not yet covered.

Insufficient ice time for each team was mentioned, and the suggestion that the ice be made available on Saturdays from 5 a.m. till 6 p.m. Collison said ice could be available till 5:30 p.m. since the pleasure skating was now intended to be from 6 p.m. rather than the afternoon. He claimed the afternoon skating was not being too well patronized.

APPLAUSE
More than one spokesman suggested the sweaters be bought from the Legion. Another suggested the registration should be increased to around \$7 or \$8 to include the cost of sweaters and socks, which the boys would keep. "The Legion sweaters were a disgrace", he added. He felt that was a small amount for 20 weeks of hockey. "I think the boys from Esquing should be included", said the spokesman for the group. This statement was greeted with loud applause. He concluded by saying, "A group like this representing the parents of 600 boys should stay together and make council get off their butts and do something about the arena".

"The Legion was told there was no more ice time available, how come there is now", another voice called out.

Collison explained there had been two hours between 5 p.m. and 7 p.m. committed but it was not picked up.

FAMILY RATE
Bill Richmond proposed that the Recreation Committee take out the insurance for all people registered in recreation, and save double and perhaps triple insurance. "Nobody is going to squawk about \$5 per boy", he commented, "but there should be a family rate for anyone with large families". He suggested they try to get sponsors for the sweaters. He contended that since many of the people working for hockey live in Esquing, that Esquing be asked to grant the \$1 per boy the same as the town is doing, failing that the parents would be asked.

The big question raised earlier but never answered was raised again. "What about the referees?"

Gerald (Perky) Perkins answered for the Referees Association who were present. "You get your executive set up, and we'll meet with you".

The whole hall broke into applause. Many of the men at the meeting filled in the form offering their services in some capacity. They were asked to state if they had coached previously and if so the name of the team. Managers and other volunteer help are also needed. The temporary executive stayed on for a private meeting.
