## Three Attend CWL Meeting

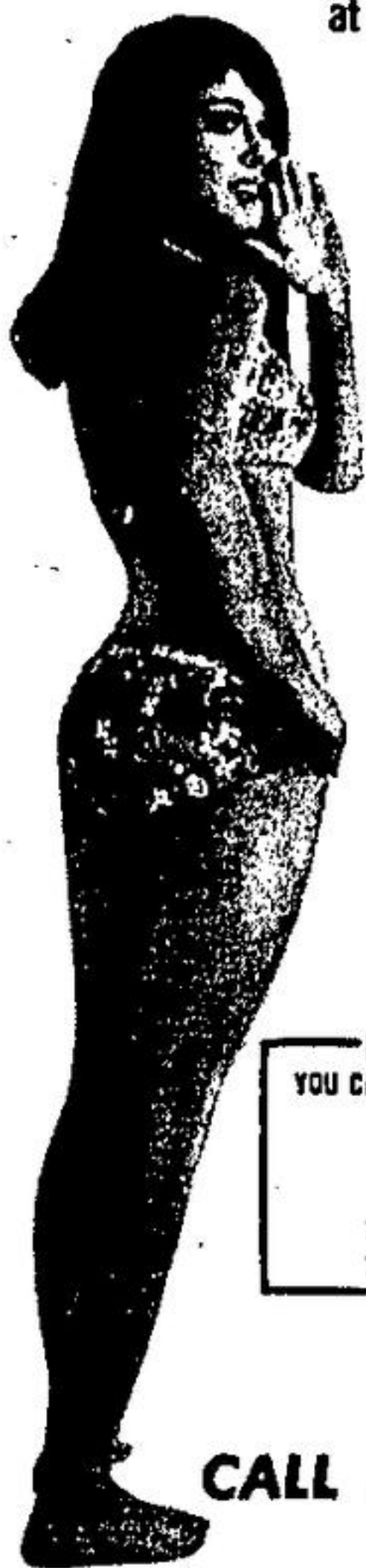
Holy Cross Church sent three representatives to the regional meeting of the Catholic Women's League in Our Lady of Assumption Church, Elfrida, October 5.

The local group's next meeting is next Monday in the rectory basement.

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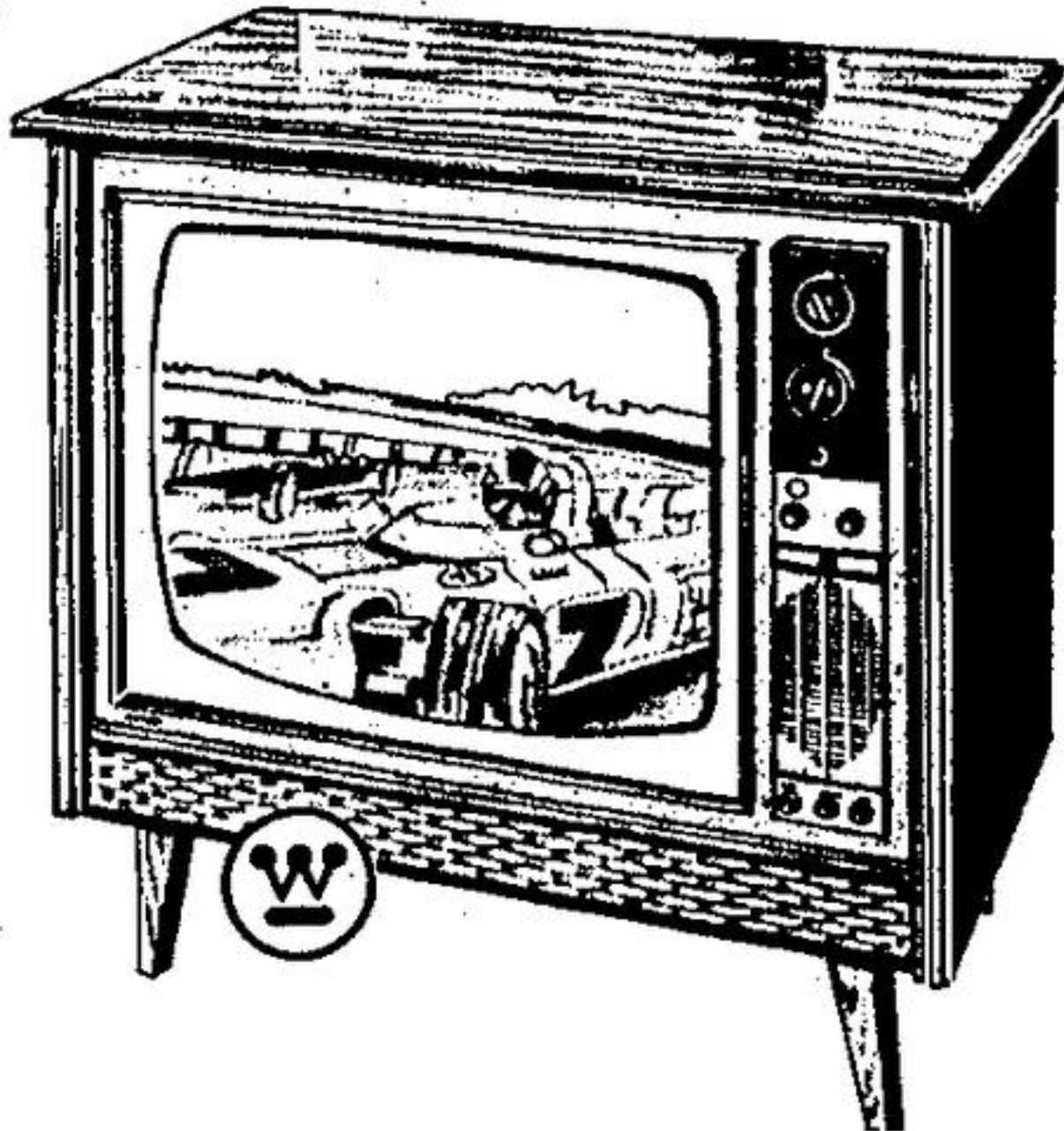
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
