### Some Aspects of Assessment Freeze

During a recent interview with Stephen Saxe senior appraiser with E. A. Mitchell Limited, Realtor, on the subject of real property assessments, certain interesting aspects of the recent provincial legislation were revealed.

Unless changes in ownership of property occurs or unless an alteration or addition which adds \$2500. or more to the market value of a property is made no 1971 assessment notice will be sent. This situation is to apply until 1974 at which time notices for the new market value assessment will be prepared for the entire province.

In essence this legislation will allow additions or alterations up to \$2500. to remain untaxed until 1975 at which time the assessment freeze ends.

**APPEALS**  
Assessment appeals are to be processed in the usual way; by forwarding the complaint to the regional registrar of the Assessment Review Court. Appeals must be filed before October 31st.

Mr. Saxe explained that the freeze period was provided to allow the assessors the amount of time necessary to complete the onerous task of converting all the province's real estate to market value assessments.
