

# New Groupings Approved District United Churches

Some changes have taken place in the grouping of United Churches in Georgetown and vicinity.

Glen Williams, which has been one of three churches under the ministry of Rev. Walter Ridley, became associated with St. John's United in town on the first of September.

Rev. Robert Scrivens, is in charge of the two churches, which have combined under one board of management. Peter Scott, who has been Mr. Scrivens' assistant the past two years, will continue to help in the ministry. He is in his last year of the theological course at Emmanuel College. The two churches will continue to hold their

own separate services.

Mr. Ridley is now minister of a newly created Norval-Huttonville charge, with Rev. Kenneth Jull as his associate. They will be in charge of four churches - Norval, Huttonville, Home and Meadowvale. And Mr. Jull will spend part of his time in hospital visitations at Peel Memorial, Brampton.

Unlike Georgetown and the Glen, the four churches will continue to operate each with its own board of management.

Mr. Ridley's former charge

was a 3-point one, Norval, Glen and Home.

The realignment in this area was spurred by the closing of Churchville United Church in June, with members there transferring to Huttonville.

Until then, Churchville, Huttonville and Meadowvale were served by one minister.

No change has occurred in the other United congregations. Rev. Kelvin Johnston continues in charge of St. Andrew's United here and the church at Ballinacaf.

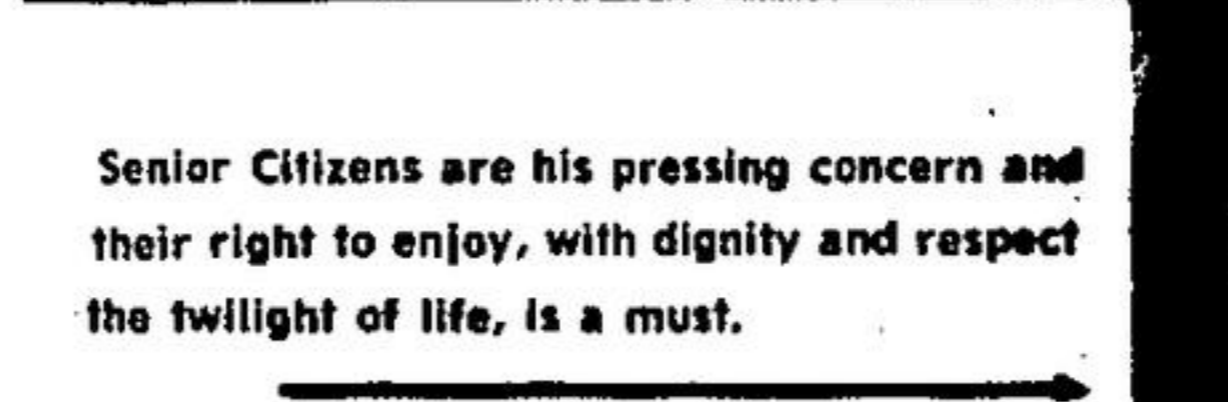

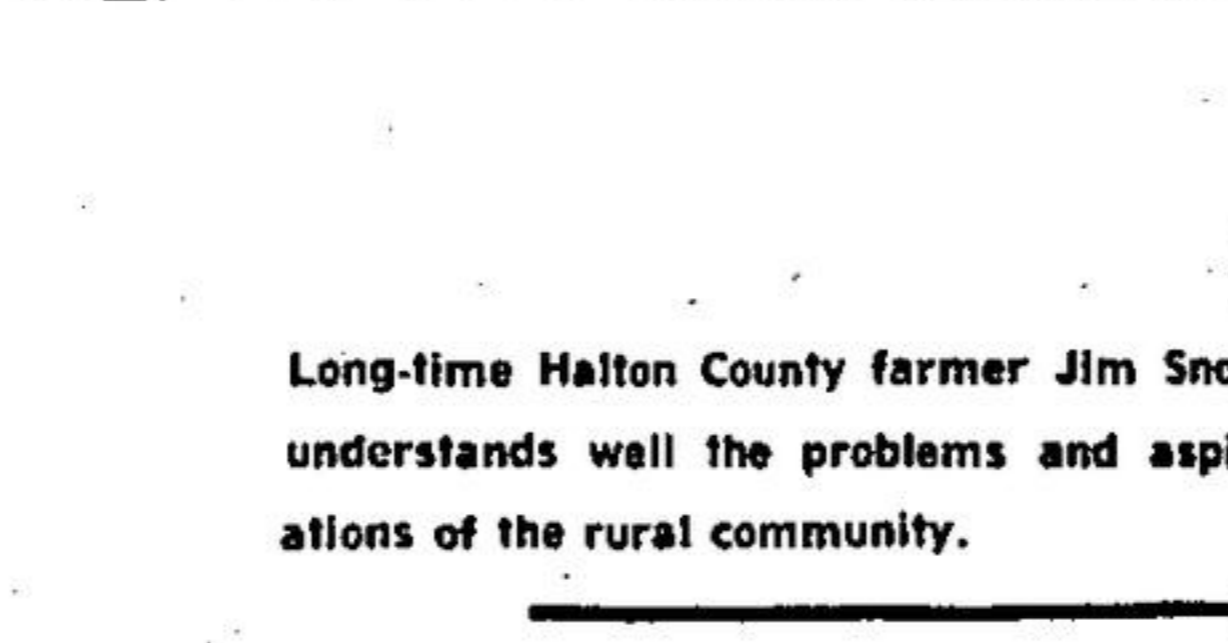
