Dump at Capacity Within One Year

The sanitary land fill site now being used by Georgetown will be full within a year, Cr. Ernie Sykes told a committee of council Thursday night.

The discussion was sparked by a resolution from the city of London asking the provincial government for subsidy on the study of waste disposal and the capital costs and maintenance of incinerators, which they felt would gradually replace land fill sites. The resolution suggested incinerators should serve regions rather than individual municipalities.

Cr. Sykes, sanitation chairman urged council to endorse the resolution since Georgetown would soon have the problem facing them.

DOING WHAT? "What are we doing about it?" asked Cr. Donna Denison, who then suggested negotiations should be proceeding now.

Deputy-reeve Art Speight pointed out a plan was being studied at the county level, with the reclamation of quarrying sites by using waste disposal, as its objective. He said it would involve the use of compacting machines. "Indusmin are already looking at various schemes to rehabilitate their quarries", said Speight.

Cr. Sykes admitted the town had taken no definite action on a new land fill site or any other method of disposal.

USEFUL Cr. Ern Hyde took issue with the phasing out of land fill sites, since he contended it was a useful method where there were many quarries.

The committee recommended that the London resolution be adopted, and set up a sub-committee of council to contact the other municipalities in Halton, to form a technical co-ordinating committee on waste disposal.

They also authorized the clerk to obtain quotations of a complete survey of waste management.
