### North-South Debate At County Council

Halton County Council will discuss a special committee's recommendations on representation at the county council meeting Oct. 19. The report basically provides for greater representation for Oakville and Burlington at the county level.

The movement has been brought about by the two southern towns, Oakville and Burlington, who feel they are entitled to a greater say in the decisions at the county level. than 80 percent of the county's share of the county spending. If approved the petition will give one additional representative to each town or township with more than 17,500 electors, two additional for 35,000 municipal electors, three for 52,500 and so on up the scale.

The greatest significance of the act is that the southern municipalities would hold the balance of power. If approved it means four additional persons would be added to county council from the southern towns and those towns would enjoy greater voting powers. All seven towns and townships in the county presently have two representatives, a reeve and deputy reeve, on the county council.

#### Funeral Service For Victim Of Accident

Cr. Ern Hyde questioned the fact there was no contract. He suggested the cost could go up after about six months, if there was no time set in the deal. He stated the Humane Society had been tried before in town, and found unsatisfactory.

Cr. Hyde promised he would have more to say when the recommendation came to council.
