### Teacher Attends Science Conference

A Georgetown man participated in a conference of science teachers in Cleveland.

I. S. Carter, 232 Mountainview Road South is chairman of the science department at Fishersville Junior High School, North York.

The Great Lakes Regional Conference of the National Science Teachers association, brought 1000 teachers from six states and Ontario to discuss such subjects as ecology and pollution, motivating the "unmotivated" student through science, and specific problems relating to teaching of science. 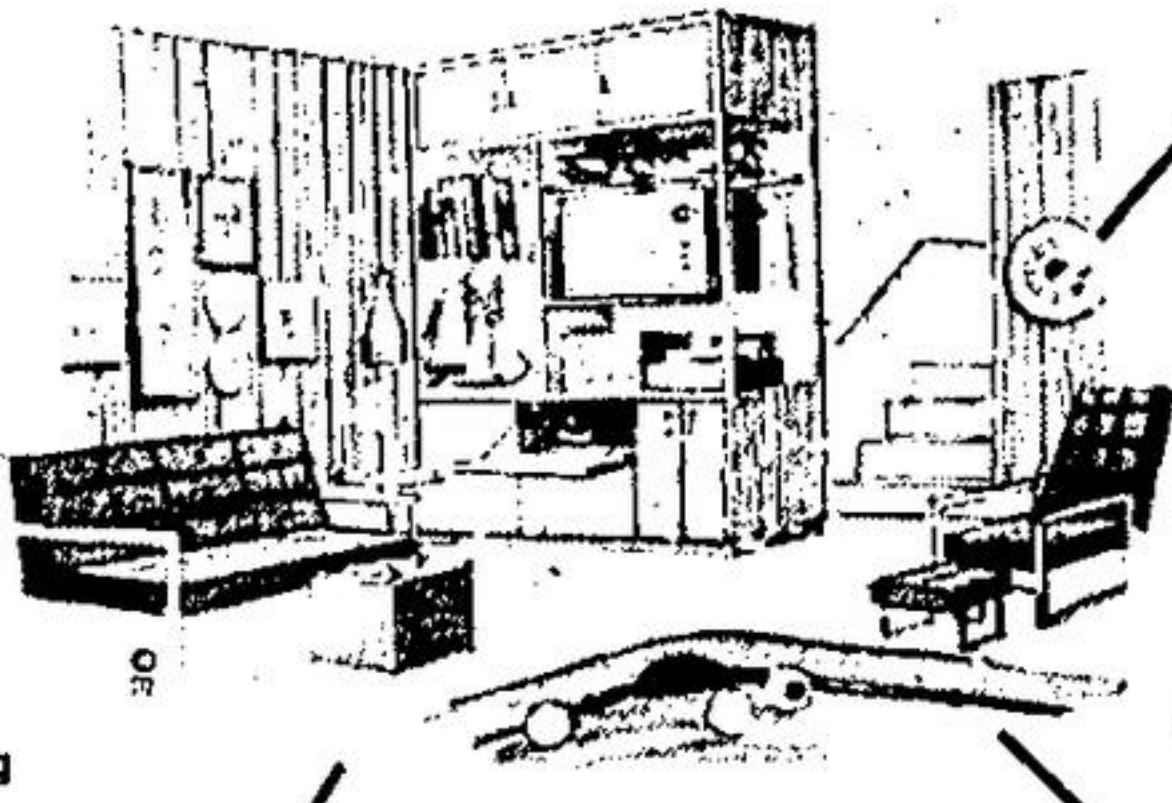

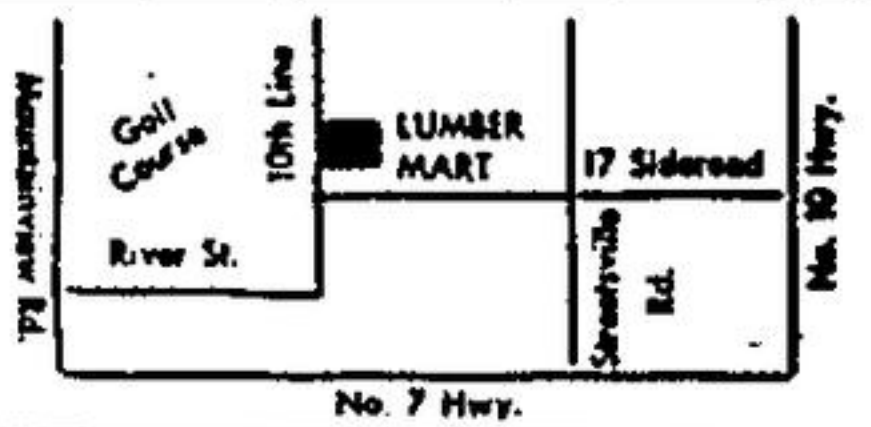
