10 Halton Firms Ask Aid to Fight U.S. Duty

The federal government's answer to aid for 10 Halton firms suffering from the United States supplementary duty on imports will be on the way shortly, says Halton MP Rud Whiting.

Whiting says a board is being set up to administer the assistance plan, which provides \$80 million to help Canadian industries continue to compete in U.S. markets despite the surtax.

For instance, a firm with \$500,000 worth of exports to a U.S. supplementary duty of \$50,000 and could get two-thirds of that amount - the United States would face \$33,000 - in a Canadian government grant under the new legislation.

GUIDELINES
The board is empowered to recommend grants to firms in cases where the normal guidelines are not met.

The guidelines are that 20 percent of the firm's production in the base year must have gone to the U.S. and the maximum grants would be two-thirds of the applicable surtax.

Whiting says he expects the board will begin processing the applications for grants by the end of this week.

OPTIMISTIC
Earlier, Whiting said eight Halton firms had contacted him concerning the impact of the surtax.

At that time he urged any other such firms in Halton being hurt by the surtax to contact him. Two more did.

Whiting is "optimistic" about the chances of support for the 10 firms.

AVOID CUTBACKS
The aid plan is primarily intended to help firms avoid employee cutbacks.

"If any other company is affected by the American import surtax, let me know and I'll give all the help I can," Whiting said.
