

New Canadian Tire Store Officially Opens November 4

The new Canadian Tire Store at Mountainview and Guelph opened its doors October 15, to curious crowds of shoppers and lookers.

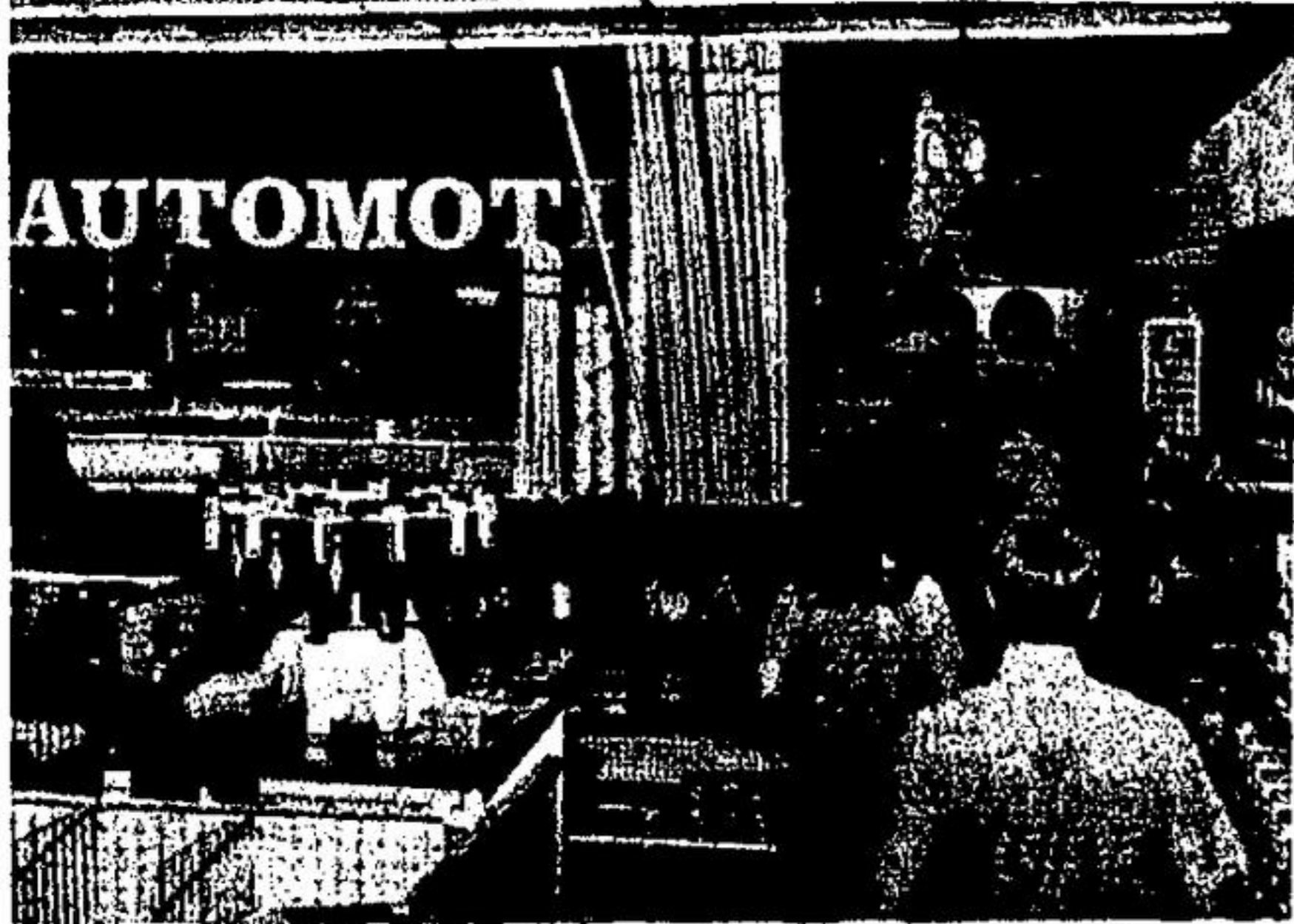
The building covers 18,000 sq. feet, and has a 6 bay garage, plus parking for 110 cars. A gas bar open 24 hours a day, is located between the store and Guelph Street.

Owner Murray Lawton bought the Canadian Tire Store from Lloyd Marks in February 1970, when the store was located at the corner of Water and Guelph Streets. This building is still owned by Mr. Marks.

September 1958, he brought the first Canadian Tire Store to town in July 1955. At that time the store was located near the I.G.A. in the Georgetown Plaza.

Raiders' Cook Has Recipe For Victory

Terry Cook's third goal of the game gave Georgetown Raiders their first win in Niagara Peninsula Intermediate A. Hockey League play last Tuesday.

Cook notched his third goal at 4:02 of the overtime period making Georgetown's margin of victory 5 to 4 over Port Colborne.

A new OHA regulation tacks a 10 minute overtime period on any game tied at the end of three periods.

Raiders almost had it won in regulation time, but a goal by Bob Judge with just 44 seconds to go in the third period forced the extra session.

Georgetown overcame a three goal deficit manufactured by the Port in the first period. Raiders

outscored the home club 2-0 in the second period and 2-1 in the third. In fact Raiders didn't get on the sheet until the game was half over. Neil Colton's goal from Ron Lane and Len Doucette came at 10:13. Cook's first from Tom Hicks, came two minutes later.

MARKSMEN

Twenty-three seconds were gone in the third period when Doucette tied it from Doug Richardson and Cook. Hicks passed to Cook for number four at 13:19, and Junior Tibbetts and Steve Blundy assisted on his overtime goal.

Bill McGowan, Joe Kish and Wayne Gallinger were Port Colborne's first period marksmen.

There were no penalties in the

third period of the overtime, and in fact all of the Raiders six minor sentences were served in the first stanza. Port Colborne drew five calls, three in the first and two in the second.

Bob Zupan in the Port's goal stopped 29 shots, and Raiders' Brian Chapman turned aside 25.

REVERSED

The pattern was completely reversed here Friday night when Georgetown built a 3-0 lead and then watched it disappear as Port Colborne snatched a 5-3 triumph.

Al Stitt, Raiders 1970-71 MVP, celebrated his return with the game's first goal from Tibbetts and Richardson at 1:49. Bill Currie converted Paul Robinson's pass in the second Raider

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goal at 2:09 of the middle period, and Doucette from Richardson and Hicks corked the Raider output minutes later.

Five Port Colborne snipers shared their scoring. Bob Goss and Bernie Laroche in the second period, and Joe Kish, Bill McGowan and Mike Green in the third.

MISCONDUCT

Raiders lost rear-guard Neil Colton with a games misconduct in the second period, and Bob Waines of the visitors squared off with Tom Hicks in the third, accounting for the game's four fighting majors.

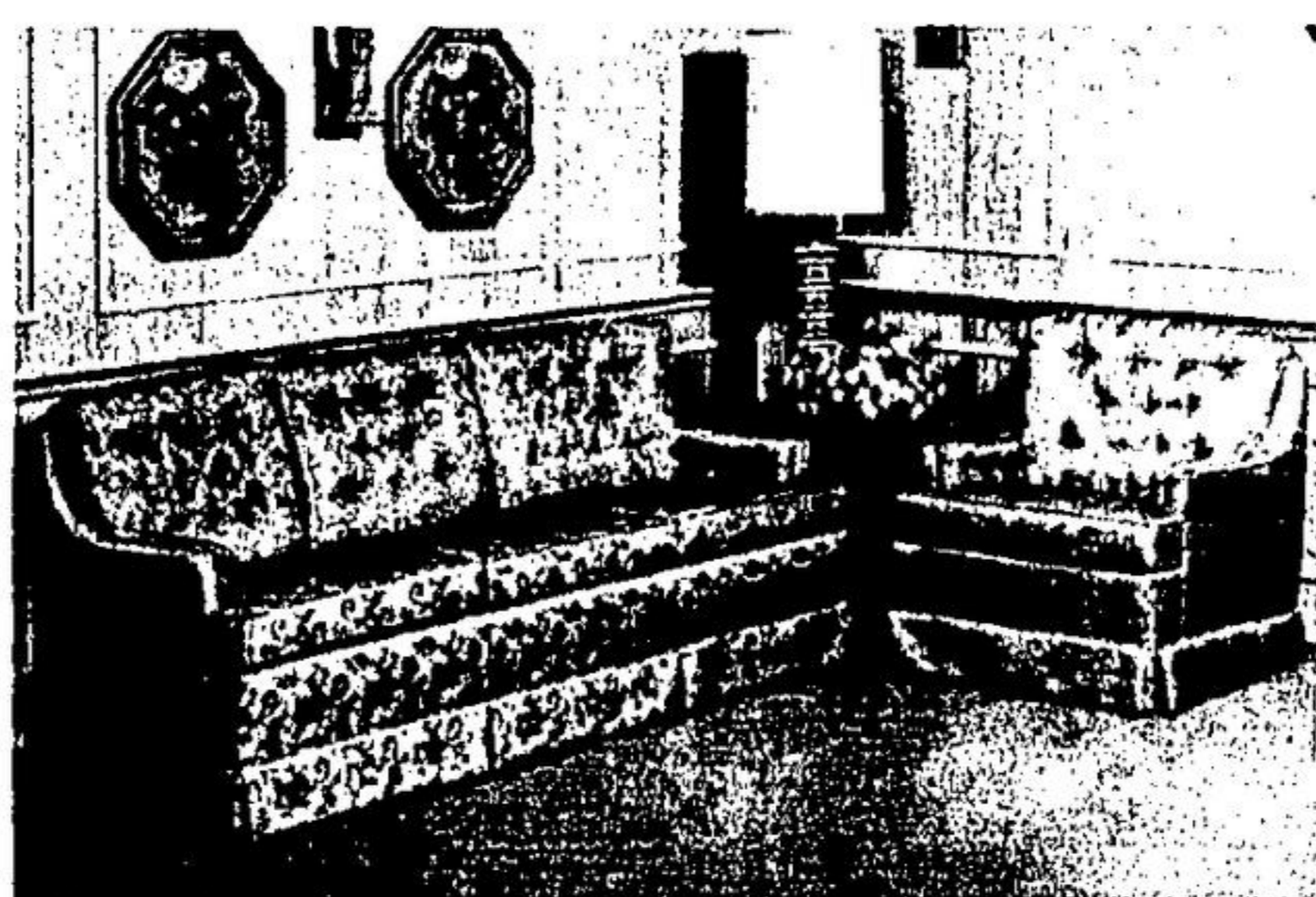
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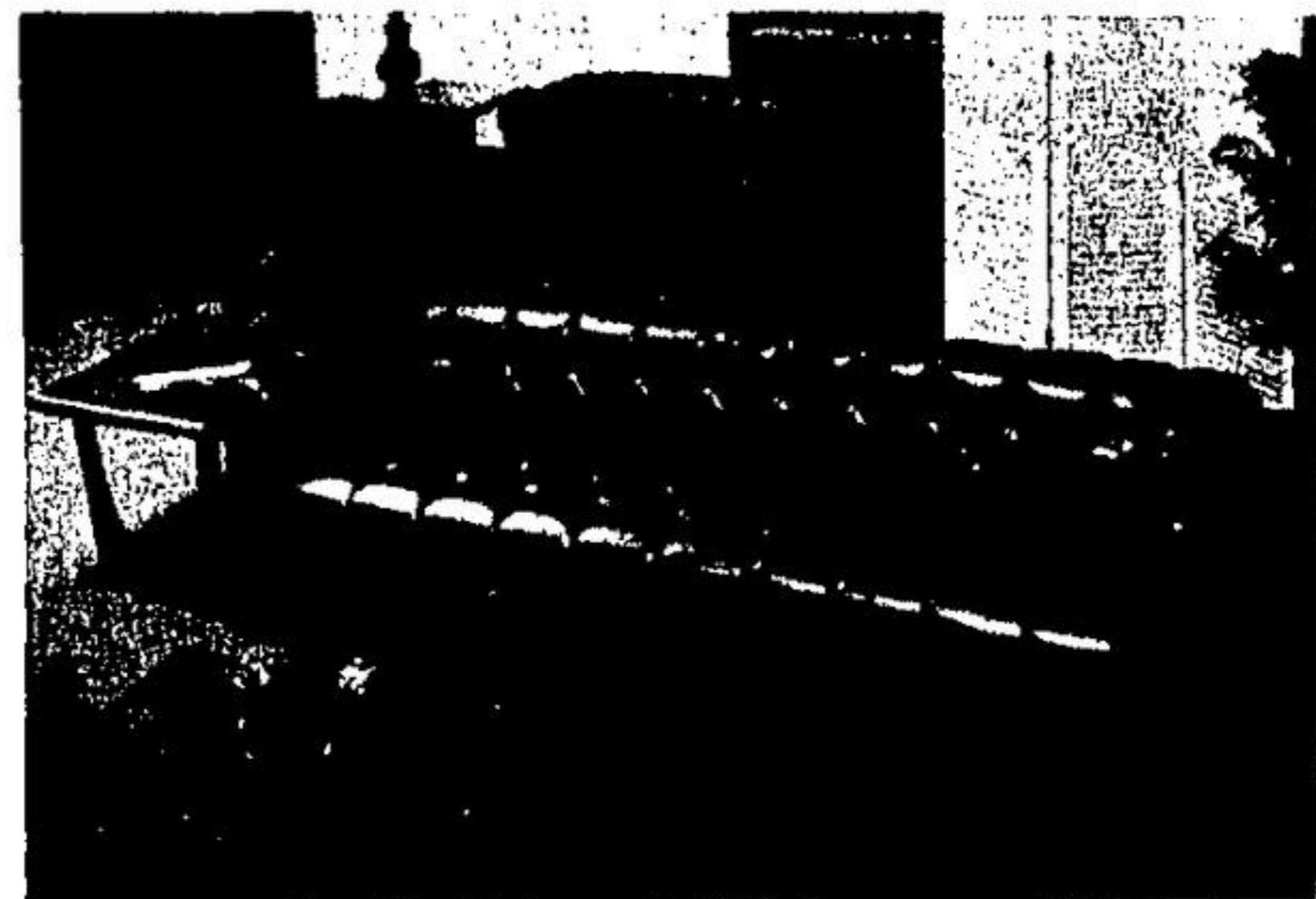
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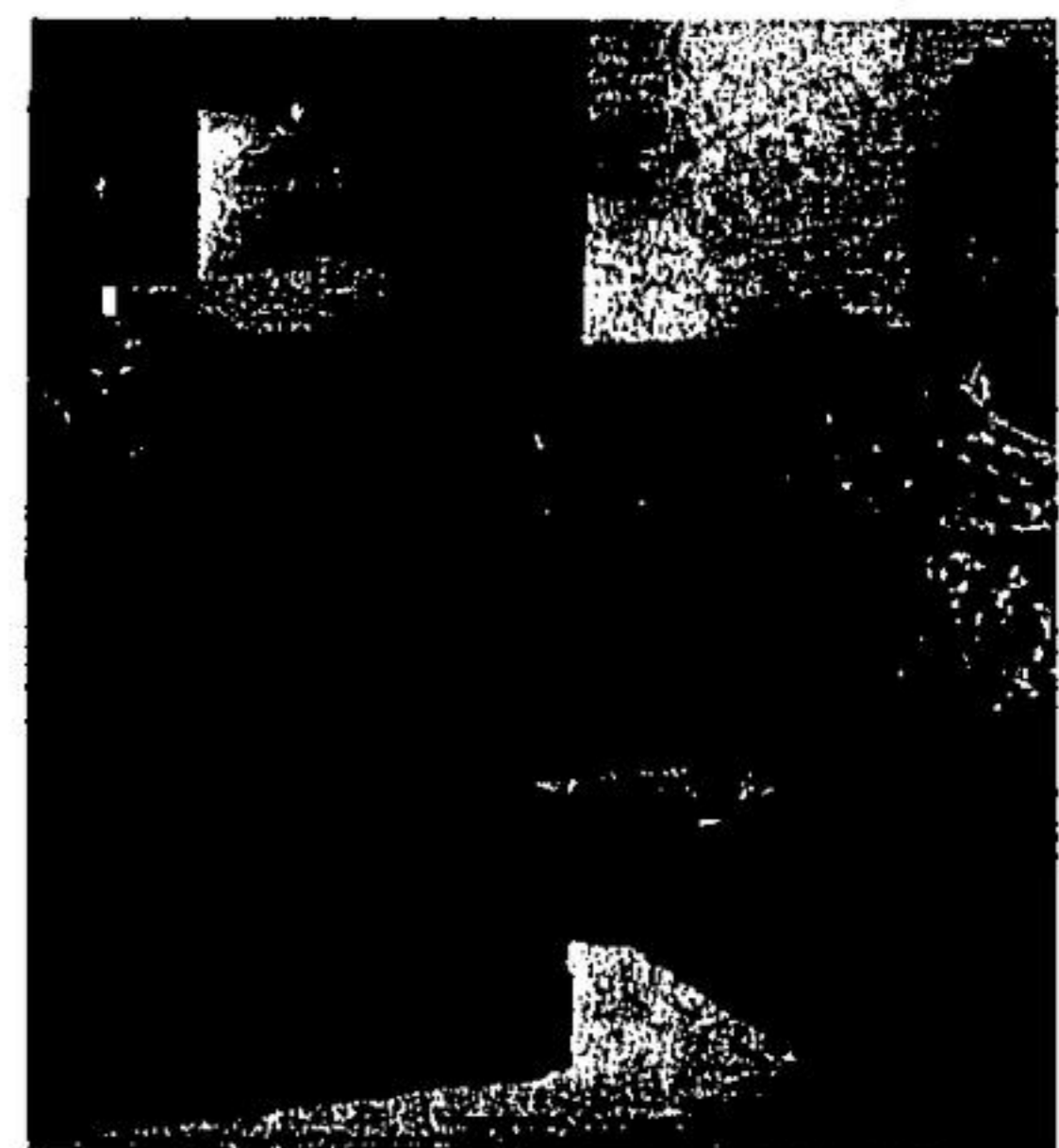
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
