

Junior Rebs Favoured in League Football Playoffs

The first-place Georgetown Junior Rebs left OTHS with four losses and one win Wednesday, downing the Red Devils 28-8. The Georgetown win was sparked by their strong running back, Bob Phillips, who scored on one touchdown and two converts against the Red Devils.

Quarterback Randy Pope added six points and Tony Pacheco was good for one touchdown, as was Pete Lauderdale.

The Rebs coach, Bill Bingham, said his team "tried to hang in there with a straight offense — we stuck to the ground."

Bingham attributes his team's success with a lot of returning players who reached the finals last year, but Keith Swarbrick the Milton coach, gives a lot of credit to Bingham. "He's some coach," said Swarbrick.

Bingham said his team could use some improvement if they hope to make the finals this year, adding that his fourth-place team won out last year and there's the possibility that the same thing could happen again this year.

Although the Georgetown offensive unit is working well for Bingham, he said "Oakville-Trafalgar got us on the passes."

The Georgetown defense allowed only three points to be scored against them in the first three games, and only 25 points in the whole season, so Georgetown really doesn't have much of a problem with its defense.

With the junior league play finished for this year it's playoff time again, with Georgetown against White Oaks and Perdue against Milton. Both games could prove to be bruising, with the prospect of a sudden-death elimination looming just ahead for all teams.

First Year Players Tri-County Hockey Group Will Appeal OMHA Ruling

In spite of a strong protest from delegates of Tri-County towns, an O.M.H.A. executive amendment restricting minor teams in the "AAA", "AA" and "A" categories to the use of first year players was passed at Saturday's O.M.H.A. annual meeting in Toronto. The O.M.H.A. is introducing a major and minor series similar to the MTHL for the first time this season. Provincial championships will be conducted for both minor and major series.

A Hespeler Minor Hockey amendment to the executive amendment that the age restrictions apply only in the "AAA" and "AA" classifications and a subsequent Chinguacousy Minor Hockey amendment that they apply only in the "AAA" classification were defeated. Voting on these two amendments was restricted to delegates from "AAA", "AA" and "A" centres.

SUPPORT
Tri-County Minor Hockey Association president Bill Rowney said after the meeting the league will appeal to the O.M.H.A. executive for permission to use first and second year

players on their minor midget teams during group play.

Support from the O.M.H.A. executive amendment came chiefly from Collingwood and Orillia spokesmen and from O.M.H.A. executive member Albert Watkins of Peterborough.

Under the new ruling second year players who are not good enough for major teams will have to drop back to the house league. They will not be able to play for minor teams.

UNBALANCED
Speaking in support of the Hespeler amendment, as a Milton Minor Hockey delegate, Bill Rowney warned this could result in unbalanced house league competition. He pointed out a second year player dropping back to house league play could conceivably score five and six goals a game.

Most Tri-County towns have had second teams for the past two seasons. They opposed the age restriction amendment because they felt minor teams should be a farm team for the major teams and that players not able to make major teams should be allowed to play for minor teams.
