Car Wash Applications Almost Down the Drain

The chances of the two car washes being built at Sinclair and Guelph, seem dimmer, following the defeat of a motion Thursday night which would have accepted 95 percent water reclamation as full reclamation. The motion was lost on a tied recorded vote, with Reeve Ric

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Morrow, deputy-reeve Art Speight, mayor Bill Smith and Cr. Ern Hyde in favour, and Crs. Ernie Sykes, Donna Denison, Joan Smith, and Harry Levy opposed. Cr. Siddall was absent.

Town engineer Eric Willis pointed out earlier in the meeting that only 13 gallons of the 230 gallons used in washing a car would enter the sewer that would be the last rinse. "So it's 95 percent reclamation", he added.

A TRACE
Cr. Ernie Sykes asked if the last rinse had been checked by the O.W.R.C. Gord Sleeman of G.A. Developments replied that there was only a trace. "001 of wax in the chemical analysis. "With this system", he said, "everything is recirculated, which is a great saving to the operator". He said the settling beds are cleaned out each week.

Cr. Joan Smith claimed the sewage plant could not stand any more overloading.

Cr. Hyde said the sewage plant was not overloaded. "It is treating everything that comes in", he said, "we know we have to add tertiary treatment, but so does every plant in Ontario".

PREMATURE
The reeve contended the small amount of water entering the sewers from the car washes would not affect the plant at all. Cr. Ernie Sykes objected because the O. W. R. C. had not been asked their opinion, while Cr. Donna Denison thought the motion was premature.

The motion to accept 95 percent reclamation as full reclamation was lost. Both applicants, Gord Sleeman of G. A. S. Developments, and Karl Magid of Wonder Car Wash, told council previously that full reclamation would cost an additional \$35,000, to handle only the remaining 5 percent of the water.

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
