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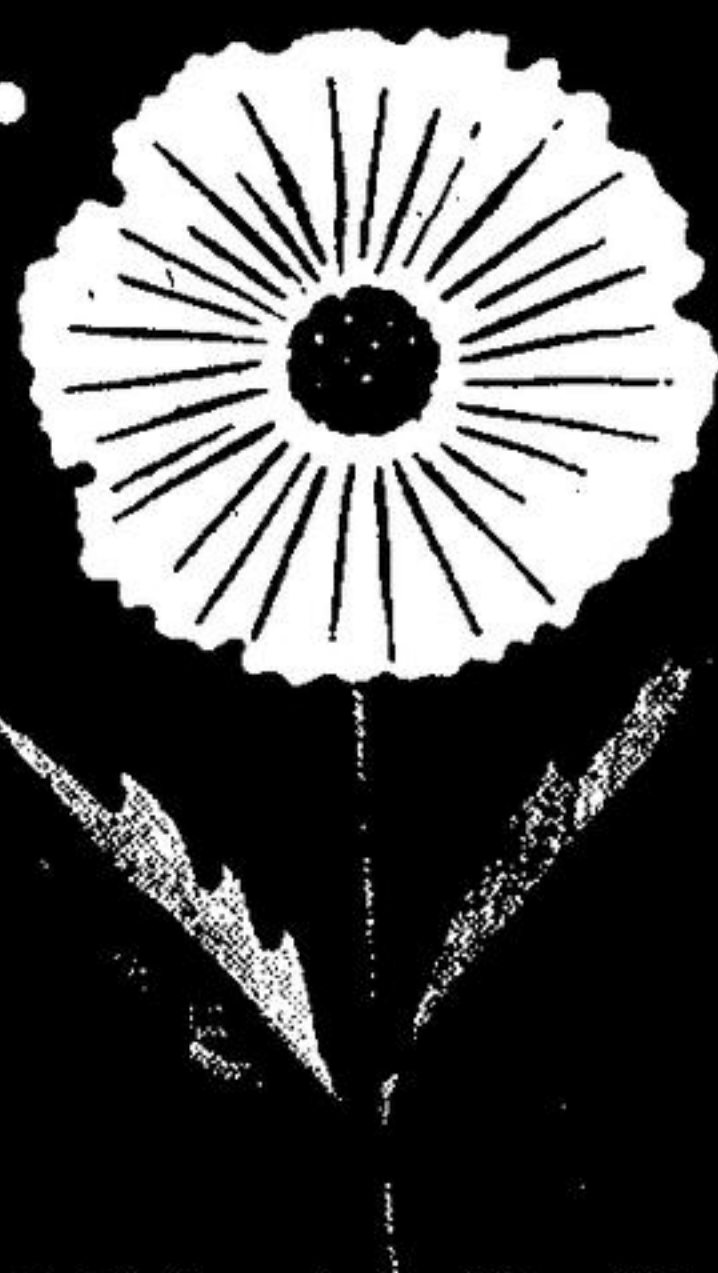

**Candles,  
Costumes  
Hallowe'en  
Hazards**

A flickering candle shining through the face of that Hallowe'en jack-o-lantern may be an eerie sight. But a flashlight or battery-powered light are much safer, says the Halton Fire Prevention Bureau.

The Bureau, in a pre-Hallowe'en safety message, cautions parents against allowing their children to use an open-flame candle to light the pumpkin. Each year the Bureau hears reports of home fires touched off by carelessness with candles. Try lighting your jack-o-lantern with a battery-powered light this year, and help prevent a costly fire.

Another Hallowe'en caution concerns children's costumes. The Bureau urges parents to look for the CSA "flame-retardant" or "flame-retardant" symbol when they buy their child a Hallowe'en costume. Children's costumes can also be flame-proofed with a solution of boric-borax.

**WHISKERS**  
Be sure any whiskers, beards, wigs, veils or hat trimmings which form part of your child's trick-or-treat costume do not obscure the child's vision or be a fire hazard, the Bureau added. For safe door-knocking, the Bureau also recommends that a parent or older brother or sister accompany small youngsters on their Hallowe'en rounds.

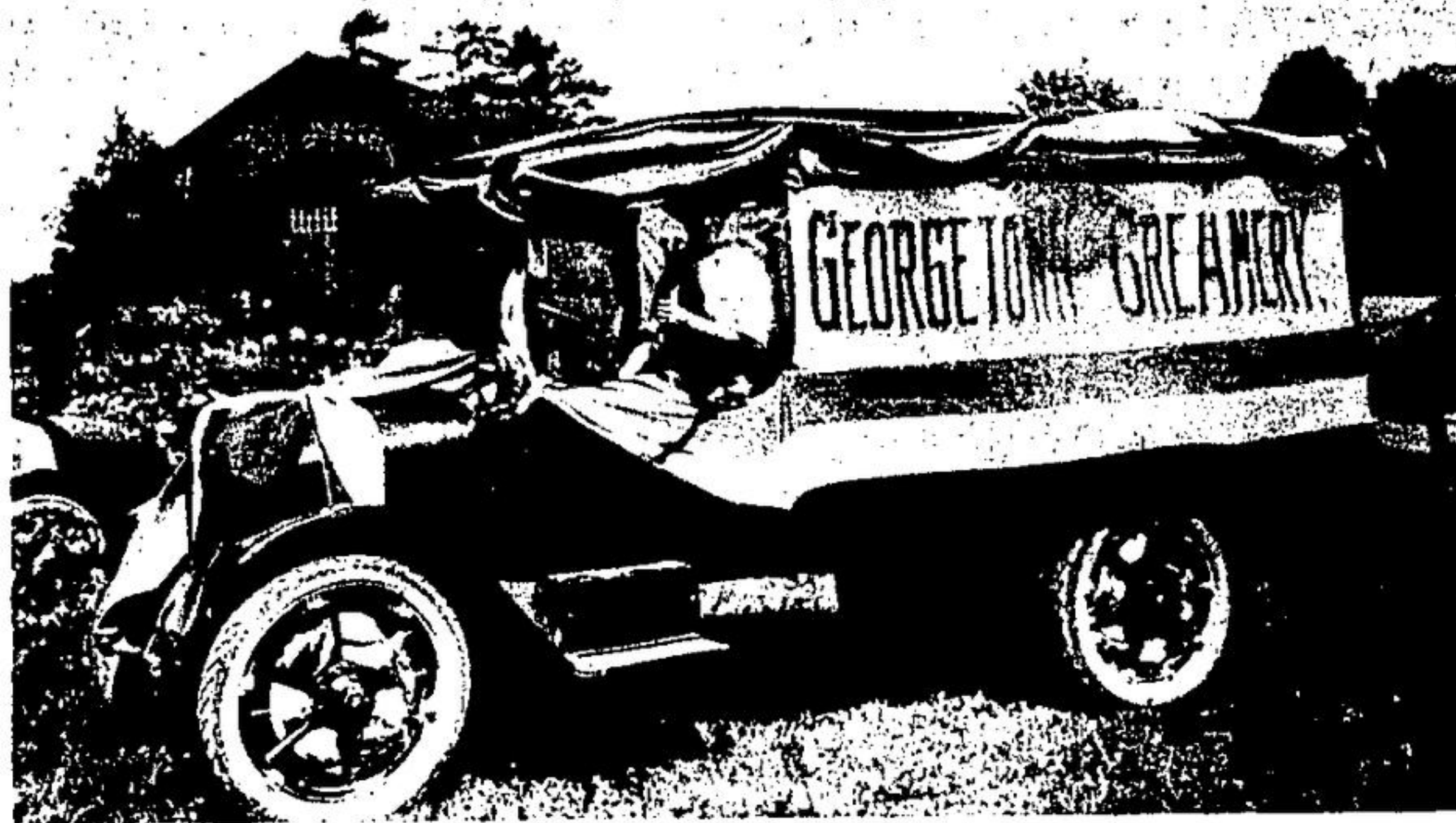
**Bridge Club**

**Four Couples for Each Available Baby**

Children's Aid officials report that for every baby available for adoption, there are now four couples willing to adopt. For the first time in 10 years adoptions did not go up in Ontario. In fact there has been a decrease. This meant that out of 7,000 or 8,000 applicants, more than half went away empty-handed in 1970. The situation is no better for them this year.

The reasons are fairly simple. The pill and abortion have cut down the number of births to unmarried women. Moreover, a changed attitude has made it possible for many single girls to opt out of the adoption solution and raise their own child.

"Nearly half the unmarried mothers who came to us for service this year have kept their children, Dr. Gordon K. Askwith,

Director of the Halton Children's Aid Society said.

**STILL NEED HOMES**  
Does this mean adoption applicants are being rejected? Not so, according to Dr. Askwith.

"We still need homes for a great number of children who are without parents—some temporarily, some permanently. We now make it a policy that, if we are unable to find an infant for an adopting couple, we ask those people if they are willing to care for another child at least on a temporary basis.

"After all, what motivates people to adopt children in the first place? In the normal mature adult there is a deep yearning to fill the parenting role. There are other ways of fulfilling this need besides birth or adoption. We are finding that our best applicants

are also excellent foster parents can get tremendous satisfaction and they are finding that they from fostering a homeless child.

**Charges High Fee for Unspayed Dogs Unfair**

Georgetown council doesn't want to appear as if it's against motherhood, even for dogs, so said Mayor Bill Smith at committee meeting Thursday night.

J. T. Hayes, of Hale Drive, told the committee he felt the \$8 license fee for unspayed female dogs was unfair, and discriminated against the owners of such dogs.

"Banks don't pay higher costs for police protection because they are more likely to be robbed, and lumber yards don't pay more for fire protection because they are vulnerable to fire", he pointed out.

"We are going held responsible for the action of other people's dogs", he maintained.

In conclusion he said "all creatures should have the right to enjoy motherhood". It was here the mayor said he would hate to think the council was against motherhood.
