County Council Adopts Rep-By-Pop Structure

Halton County Council took a step towards regional government Tuesday, Oct. 19, with a request for revision of the County of Halton Act. The revision would increase Burlington and Oakville voting power on the council.

The draft of the new Act will be forwarded to the private bills committee of the Ontario legislature.

Passage of the Act would, through a rep-by-pop formula, give Burlington four members and Oakville three on a 17-member council.

On recorded votes voting strength would give the South Halton Town of Oakville and Burlington the same number of votes as the other five municipalities together.

At present the five smaller municipalities in North Halton have 10 members to four and on recorded votes have a three vote majority over Burlington and Oakville.

Each of the seven

municipalities now has two members, a reeve and deputy reeve, on the 14-member council. The warden will continue to be elected by secret ballot among the councillors.

OPPOSITION
The move had met some opposition mainly that it would give power to the county to the "southern towns" at the expense of the "northern towns and townships."

Jim Swanborough, Burlington reeve, attacked this viewpoint and an article from the Canadian Champion, Milton's newspaper which advocated it.

He said the article's view that the new formula would disturb the balance of power between north and south was incorrect.

Georgetown Reeve Ric Morrow said Oakville and Burlington have four of 14 councillors and now would have seven of 17. He said this would not disrupt any balance of power.

75 PERCENT OF BILLS
Morrow also said council was dealing with a fair request for more representation from the two municipalities which pay 75 per cent of the county's bills.

He said there could be little future for the county council. Oakville and Burlington representatives generally stayed out of the discussion or adopted conciliatory positions verging on neutrality in the discussion.

The Nassagaweya and Esquesing representatives also said little on the matter. Percy Barr, Milton deputy reeve, was the only councillor who said the move should not be voted upon by Council.

URGES VOTE
He said, "Extra representatives should be put in by a vote of the people, not by appointment."

He also said that the restructuring of county governments by the province was a good

reason to leave the matter in abeyance.

"We would be lax in our duties to pass this," Barr said. "None of us is over-worked."

Morrow said, "It sounded like there's an election coming up in Milton."

MILESTONE
Art Spelght, Georgetown deputy reeve said the proposal was a milestone in county history and a "tribute to the broad-mindedness" of Burlington and Oakville.

Morrow had said earlier that the agreement had been made by Burlington and Oakville for the betterment of the county. He hoped that the practice of deferring to each other in matters like this could continue for harmonious relations.

Masson said he hoped the relations between the reeves and deputy reeves could continue to be as good.

Burlington and Oakville had once considered becoming cities, Masson said, because of the north-south conflict on council.

EVEN VOTE POWER

The proposed Act would even actual voting power between the five municipalities in North Halton on one side and Burlington and Oakville on the other.

Under the new system Burlington and Oakville will have the same number of votes as the other five together. The total number of votes will vary as population varies.

Both systems potentially give each member more than one vote when decisions are recorded.

Reeve Morrow mentioned at one point that there have been no recorded votes so far in 1971.

R. C. School Board Consider Co-Operating On Night School

Halton County Separate School Board trustees have discussed but not voted on a request from the Halton Board of Education for co-operation with the county board's adult education program.

FLYERS
Willard Price, director of education for the public school board, asked separate school trustees for permission to send public school adult education courses flyers home with separate school pupils.

The film library interchange could involve a loan from the public board to the separate school system to allow the Catholic schools to buy about 246 films.

PUBLIC RELATIONS
Separate school trustees also met with representatives of a Kitchener public relations firm to study the possibility of hiring it to issue newsletters, press releases and annual reports.

The separate school board also delayed a decision on education committee guide-lines about inviting parent volunteers to assist teachers. The guide-lines were not made public.

Thirty-Nine Applicants On 'Home' Waiting List

Halton County Council's Property Committee agreed with members of the Manor Committee that a second home for the aged was needed, and urgently, when they met Friday afternoon.

Chairman of the property committee Harry Barrett, said there were 39 applicants on the waiting list to get into Halton Centennial Manor in Milton.

The committee has considered purchasing land in Oakville where Ortona Barracks stand. A decision on that count is expected soon.

While the committee did not deal with possible sites at Friday's meeting, they agreed with the Manor committee recommendation to begin the proceedings for a new home for the aged.

committee discussed massive plans for expansion. A new county garage and health unit were among the projects considered. The county is also considering building a second administration building behind the one that exists on Steeles Ave. in Milton.

Consideration was given to moving the Health Unit there and using the extra space to alleviate crowded conditions that now exist in some of the county and provincial departments at the existing building.
