## Halton's Students Have Sports Options

# Volpe Has Made Old Style Phys. Ed. Thing of Past

Halton County schools have been involved in competitive sports programs for a long time, but never have the sports curriculums been so varied as in recent years.

A far cry from the constant drills of the good of physical training classes, students in Grades 11 and 12 can choose their own physical education options in many county schools.

Golf, sailing and tennis—never taught in county schools until the last few years—are available to many students under the Halton County Board of Education.

The man in Halton responsible for much of the change in physical education is Nick Volpe, co-ordinator of physical and health education for Halton schools.

A veteran of the Big Four football league, Volpe has taught physical education at several levels and coached football players from junior high school teams to the Lakeshore Bears in the Ontario Junior conference.

LIST OF PRIORITIES  
Volpe says he has "a list of priorities to meet the needs of all students."

"First on the list are the physical education classes, followed by intramural and inter-school sports," he says.

To be successful at both the elementary and secondary school levels, Volpe says the students must be actively involved with a sport, learn from it and enjoy the activity.

"The enjoyment is in competing, that's why the emphasis is put on the popular competitive sports such as football, basketball and hockey. If people are athletically inclined, they turn to the popular sports," Volpe says.

CONCEPT CHANGING  
Even though the Halton schools concentrate a good number of physical education classes on the most popular sports, that concept is slowly changing, says Volpe.

"The program is starting to focus on leisure time and lifestyle," he says adding that not everyone can be a good football or basketball player or have interest in the three prime sports.

At the elementary level, Volpe is trying to institute further change in physical education by getting more scheduled physical education classes for the younger students.

"We're attempting to get one period per day above the recess periods," he says. Right now the elementary schools have two periods of physical education per week, plus intramural sports in grades four, five and six, with inter-school sports for the grade seven and eight students.

LACK COACHES  
The highest priority sports at

the elementary school level now are volleyball, basketball, and cross-country skiing—sports which are represented at the Halton County championships.

One of the biggest problems faced by school sports is the lack of trained coaches, Volpe says. The individual school principals are responsible for hiring the teaching staff at their school and consequently some schools have a surplus of coaches while others have barely an adequate number of coaches.

"If a principal is looking for a science teacher, he might happen to find a qualified teacher who is also a track coach—in that case everything works out well," Volpe says. If the principal finds the best teacher for an opening is not a coach, then the teacher will probably be hired anyway and the school team suffers. It's not anybody's fault—that's just the way it is.

TEACHER SURPLUS  
"With the surplus of teachers we now have, the situation is going to change," predicts Volpe. With the surplus, principals will be able to choose from more candidates for each position—and qualified teachers who also are qualified coaches will probably get the first job opportunities.

Volpe says the Halton Board of Education has never encouraged high school teams to get outside coaches, but when qualified teacher-coaches are not available there is little alternative if the students are to compete on school teams.

Volpe says the school board has eased its views considerably in the past few years, but it still prefers teacher-coaches over any others.

## Your Own Fault If Vote Missed

A number of persons had their names left off Halton East provincial riding voters' list because of mistakes by enumerators, a spokesman at the constituency returning officer's office says. However anyone who found themselves in that position had plenty of time to correct the situation before election day.

"The Election Act provides five days in which the returning officer sits as a board of revision," the official says. "Voters' lists, not enumerators' lists, are posted throughout the entire riding three weeks before election day. It is the voters' responsibility to make sure his or her name is on the voters' list."

"While the returning officer endeavours to make sure all names are on the lists through the enumerators in the final analysis the Election Act places the onus on the voter to make sure his name is on the list."

**\$30 DEDUCTION IF MEETING MISS**

Modifying legislation which will give Georgetown councillors a \$2500 yearly salary next year, council passed a motion Monday which will deduct \$30 for each meeting missed. If a councillor is absent on municipal business, however, he will not be docked the \$30.
