her name is on the voters' list." "While the returning officer endeavours to make sure all names are on the lists through the enumerators in the final analysis the Election Act places the onus on the voter to make sure his name is on the list."

Halton County schools have been involved in competitive sports programs for a long time, but never have the sports curriculums been so varied as in recent years.

A far cry from the constant drills of the good ol'physical training classes, students in Grades 11 and 12 can choose their own physical education options in many county schools.


