**Winter Works Grant Double 1970**  
Halton County has been granted a \$28,700 winter works allocation by the provincial government. Property committee members were notified of the grant Monday and intend to study its uses.

The amount is over double last year's grant of \$12,000 which the county was unable to use entirely. Only two months were available for spending it. The new allocation is for projects up to May 31, 1972. Deputy reeve Harry Barrett said the doubling of the county grant could mean a similar doubling for the municipalities as well. "The usual formula for the municipalities has been about one dollar per head. Perhaps we can expect two dollars per head this year," he said.
