Times were hard and Mrs. Norton recalled that her father worked as a barker, stripping bark from the logs at the old papermill, now the DeltaCrafts furniture factory on River Drive, for a dollar for a ten hour day. He would carry a 100 pound bag of flour from Stewarstown home on his back.

She moved with the Watsons when he was transferred to Milton and then to Toronto. The Watsons employed an upstairs girl, dining room girl, cook, nurse and governess for their children. In Toronto she was homesick, with only every fourth Sunday off to come home, and she returned to work at the old Sykes and Ainley textile mill in the Glen. It burned down some years later.

She worked a 10 hour day as a weaver for 50c a day. Later she became a housemaid in the Ainley home for \$6.00 a month.

Following their marriage in Acton in 1894, Mr. and Mrs. Norton lived in the Glen. He worked at Beaumont Knitting Mills. Housekeeping included raising chickens, pigs and a couple of cows in the small barn behind the house. Preserving and canning, buttermaking and baking were all part of the chores for Mrs. Norton.

Agencies in Halton Building Feel Cramped

Halton County is beginning to plan expansion of its administrative facilities. The building the county offices are in was erected in 1962 and is beginning to get cramped. A major strain on the facilities is the growing demand for space among the provincial agencies in the building. The county intends to write to the attorney-general's department about the future needs for space, especially in the registry office. Deputy reeve Harry Barrett said yesterday at a council property committee meeting the province may be planning to move the

registry and land titles closer to Oakville and Burlington because that is where the majority of land transactions take place. The county has offered to sell its building to the province for \$1 million and assumption of debentures but the offer was turned down. Agencies associated with the

county, Halton Health Unit, Children's Aid Society and Halton Region Conservation Authority are not located in the county building because of lack of room. No indication has been given on when the county will start expansion. DID YOU KNOW?
