## \$3,400 Grant For Erosion Control Work

The Honourable James W. Snow, M.P.P. for Halton East, and Minister without Portfolio has announced the approval of a Provincial Grant in the amount of \$3,400.00 to the Halton Region Conservation Authority to carry out erosion control measures at the Kelso Conservation Area.

The Authority has been carrying out a program of stabilizing the reservoir shoreline in the Kelso Conservation Area. It is now proposed to construct erosion control measures along a section of the reservoir near the Town of Milton pump-house.

All municipalities are designated as benefiting from the project and will pay the Authority's share of the cost.

## Science-Waterloo Hosts Local School Students

Science-Waterloo, a series of visits to the Faculty of Science at the University of Waterloo, will provide a day of science for interested senior high school students on Friday. The visits are designed to provide a typical day of science learning and show it "like it is."

Schools participating will be Lord Elgin H. S., Burlington; Georgetown District High School; Port Hope High School; Notre Dame College School, Welland; Sauguenay District High School, Port Elgin and St. Catharines Collegiate and Vocational Institute. About 216 senior high school students are expected.

The visitors will sit in on regular lectures and labs, mixing freely with university students. They will have chosen their lectures and labs in advance from a timetable covering university physics, chemistry, biology, and earth sciences. If they wish to talk to a faculty member from the School of Optometry they will have an opportunity to do so. This is a day of participation in university learning - students will take notes, make observations in experiments, ask questions, etc.

Feedback from previous years has shown that students enjoy this type of program. For some it is their first visit to the UW campus and they are impressed not only with the buildings, facilities and equipment but appreciate the opportunity to meet and talk with members of the Faculty of Science.

Some 150 high schools will take part in the 1971-72 visits, bringing more than 4,000 students to the Waterloo campus.
