Explains Complex Golden Gate Owner Addresses Sorority

Al Pilluti, owner of Golden Gate Construction which has built the new condominiums on Mountview Road, was special speaker at the October 26 meeting of Zeta Phi Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi. The subject of his talk was his newest project the proposed construction of a high rise apartment complex, a motor inn and restaurant lounge, on Guelph Street. Members were very interested in seeing the proposed layout and admired the plans displayed by Mr. Pilluti. A question and answer period then followed. Mr. Pilluti was introduced by Mrs. Norma Tripp.

Other locations used were the Windsor Court House and Jail, a park and a balcony. Don't Renew Pit Permit Mines Minister is Urged

Terra Gotta & District Preservation Committee has petitioned the provincial government to place a gravel pit in the public domain and not to renew a permit after November 30 for further commercial operations.

The Committee, chaired by Terra Gotta residents John Agg and William Doole, claims that the character of this part of the Niagara escarpment is being affected by the operation of a pit by Consolidated Sand & Gravel.

In a letter to Mines Minister E. L. Bernier, the Committee says that it represents the views of hundreds of distressed residents, and thousands of Ontario people have expressed sympathy with its objectives.

"We strongly urge you to adopt Recommendation II as outlined by Mining Commissioner J. F. McFarland in his report of October 29," the letter says. "It offers the only hope for preserving the character of this community, which is visited annually by thousands of tourists, sightseers, picnickers and school children associated with the Fred Gagey Board of Education field study centre, immediately adjacent to the Hurlidge pit."

The Committee says that the many proposed controls suggested in other recommendations in Mr. McFarland's report "to some extent would eliminate a number of irksome side effects of pit operations."

But it says renewal of a pit licence "would entail intolerable traffic conditions and generally destroy the peace and quiet of a scenic, escarpment area."

The Committee has asked the Minister to place the property in the public domain "by purchase or expropriation, for whatever ecologically and environmentally responsible purpose the Ontario government may select."

"We are in sympathy with the aggregate industry's needs," the letter concludes "but sooner or later escarpment sources will disappear and alternative locations must be found. Why not explore these possibilities now while some of our heritage remains intact?"

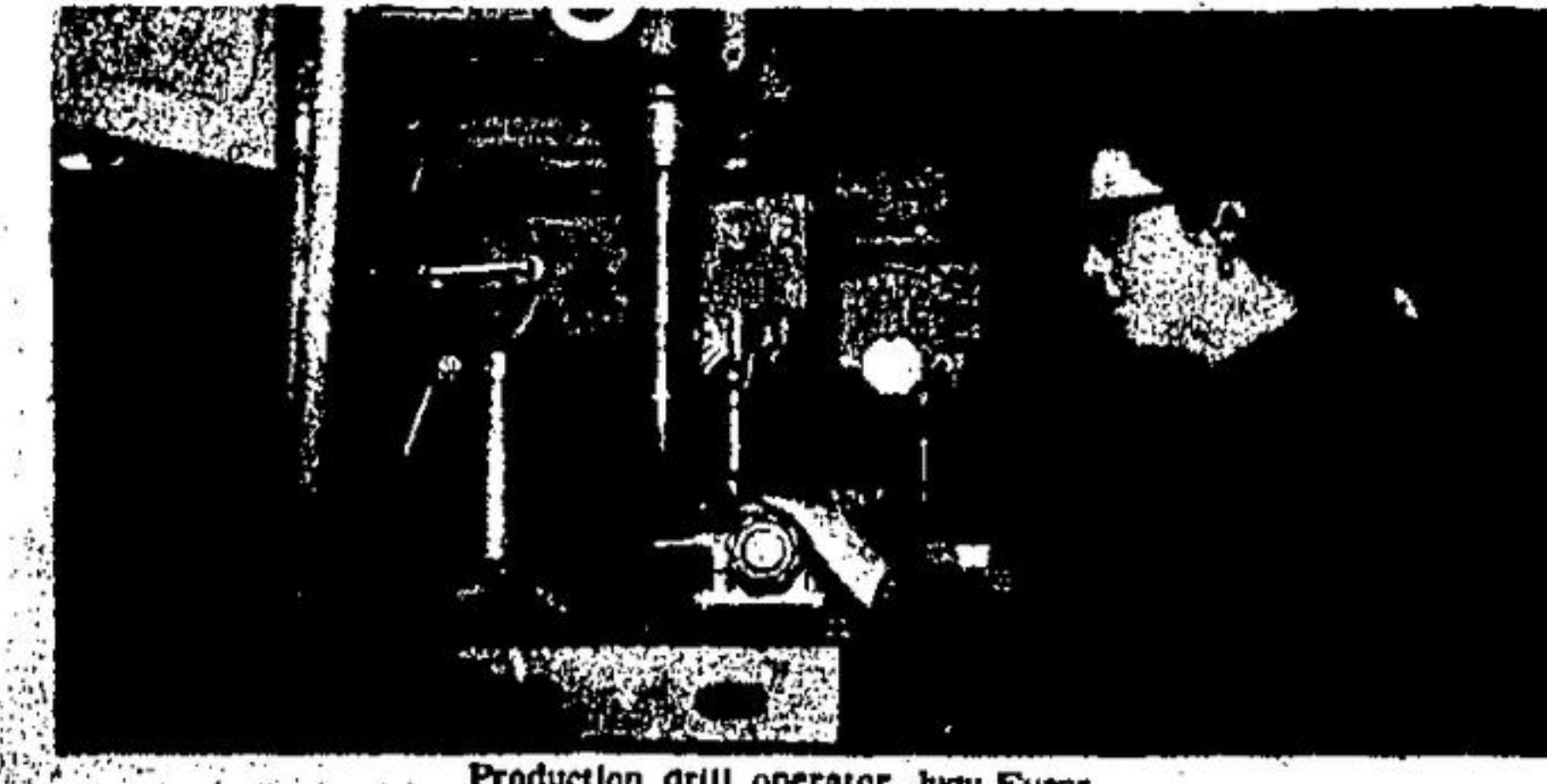
