No Late Night Snowmobiling In the Villages

Late night snowmobiling has been banned in the four hamlets of Glen Williams, Norval, Limehouse and Stewarttown.

Monday night Esqueping council passed a by-law prohibiting any snow vehicle from operating in these villages between the hours of 11 p.m. and 7 a.m. except on Sundays when the hours are extended to 9 a.m.

However anyone leaving or returning home earlier or later than those hours will be allowed to do so.

In addition snowmobiling will be prohibited on sidewalks, boulevards, or median strips.

Bright Face Witnessed My After-Dark Rainbow

My first good rainbow on a polar bear streamer was caught just at dark without a full moon in the sky. It weighed 9 1/2 pounds and was 25 1/2 long with a waist measurement of 19 inches. It was very heavy with ripe roe.

My chum Charlie Ginglio of Milton and I were again on the Saugenee River, on October 30th. The crowd had petered out and we left the big pool at the clay-banks for our favourite pool up river.

BRIGHT MOON
We arrived there and found it vacant of anglers. Darkness was closing in and a bright moon was rising in the sky.
We were casting our big streamers and using all the tricks in the book for approximately one hour. The bright moon made one think of the semi down hour in the morning.
From past experience I had no confidence of having any luck with trout with "ole bright face" up there.
It was always the old saying "when the moon comes up head for the cabin."
With this in mind I was thinking of saying to my chum; "Let's go Charlie" but the words never came. The thought was interrupted by a vicious strike and the slack line was forced through my left hand as the fish took off down river.

ANXIOUS MOMENTS
My landing net was on the bank behind me; so I spent some anxious moments until I had it again. After a few minutes the fish was safe in the net 100 yards down stream. The time was approximately 8:20 p.m. when the prize was on the bank. The Polar bear streamer was secure in the lower part of the mouth.
The prize was a female rainbow heavy with roe, 23 1/2 long, a girth of 15 1/2 inches and weighed 9 1/2 pounds.

ANOTHER FIRST
So this was another first for me in regards to fall fly fishing. It was

No doubt the streamer was taken for a minnow which are abundant in the river.

Bait fishermen especially those that use roe prefer higher water and a little more murky.
