Completes Course In Horticulture

A Sheridan Nurseries employee, Alain LeTarnac, R.R. 4 was one of 18 graduates of the horticultural and landscaping apprenticeship program, who were honored at a meeting held at the Humber College of Applied Arts and Technology.

Also in the group was Frank Matos, formerly of Georgetown when he was employed with Sheridan.

The class was the first to graduate in a course instituted two years ago at Humber. Forty students are currently enrolled.

LONG NEEDED
Graduates were guests of the Ontario Landscapers and Contractors Association. Bruce Evans, a past president told them that their training program fulfilled a need long felt by the association for more trained horticulturists and landscapers in Ontario.

The course was instituted with the assistance of the Department of Labour which included students in its apprenticeship program.

TWO TERMS
They spent two terms at Humber College. The first, of 12 weeks, provided basic knowledge concerning the industry. Following a work period, they returned for eight weeks for an advanced course which covered business practice, surveying, cost estimating, surface contouring, drainage, turf and grounds maintenance, tree planting and nursery operation.

Claim Cars Parked at School Endanger Pupils

Cars parked on both sides of Duncan Drive opposite St. Francis of Assisi School are a hazard to the school children. Cr. Ernie Sykes told council in committee Monday night.

He said there was big paved area in the yard which should be used for teacher parking. "The kids are running out from between parked cars", he added.

Town engineer Eric Willis said the zoning administrator had called the school principal about it, and had been told they were letting the children use the paved area until the new grass was rooted, then the cars would be parked on the paved area.

SHOULD INSIST
Council instructed the Zoning Administrator to ask St. Francis of Assisi School to have the cars removed from Duncan Drive and Sinclair Avenue.

Cr. Joan Smith pointed out that cars parked on Mountview in front of the new condominium had also been a hazard. "I know there are 'No Parking' signs there now, but I think we should insist that all parking lots for multiple dwellings be paved before the units are occupied."

The Zoning Administrator was asked to investigate.

Help Problem Children Challenge to UW Club

The members of the Georgetown Chapter of the Canadian Federation of University Women were challenged at their last meeting to become volunteers to help elementary school children who might be having problems.

This challenge was presented by Miss Margaret Kirk, psychometrist with the Psychological Services Branch, Halton County Board of Education, guest speaker for the evening. Miss Kirk was introduced by Mrs. Elaine Wasserman, who has already had some experience as a volunteer worker.

INTEREST IN CHILDREN ASSET
Miss Kirk provided description of the psychological services of the Halton County Board and explained how members of the University Women's Club could help in the schools.

The children who would benefit from the volunteer worker's efforts might possibly have minor social, psychological or educational problems. The child who does not feel that he is a part of his family may be helped by this service; or perhaps the child who is not given enough attention but who has average ability could benefit from the volunteer worker's efforts.

THE VOLUNTEER'S ROLE
The volunteer worker would act as a friend, in a supporting role and could provide an example of proper behaviour.

The procedure for becoming a volunteer would entail making an application; having an interview with the County Service members; meeting with the principal and the teacher; and upon being accepted as a volunteer for a particular child, coming to the school for two 1-hour sessions a week with the child.

PROGRAM ALREADY EFFECTIVE
Oakville- and Burlington are organized under this program. Miss Kirk encouraged participation from the Georgetown area, as need for assistance always exists.

Following a brief question period, Mrs. Coleen Cruikshank thanked Miss Kirk for coming.

Prior to the guest speaker's address, the business portion of the meeting was chaired by the president, Mrs. Janet Manderson. Included in the business was the formation of two study groups, a literary book group and an art group chaired by Mrs. Eleanor Langdon and Mrs. Betty McKenzie respectively.

The next meeting will be December 7 with Mr. Ray Lowes, Secretary of the Bruce Trail Association as guest speaker. The public is welcome to attend this meeting.

Tougher to Detect County's Bad Corners

Increased road subsidies and accident statistics will be major items at a Dec. 3 meeting between Halton county roads committee and the minister of transportation and communications.

Roads chairman James Swainborough, Burlington reeve, will lead the delegation of committee members and county staff.

The accident-statistics problem is one of long-standing with the county.

Until 1966 the highways department provided periodic summaries of accidents on county roads giving the cause of each accident.

Bruce Kitchen, county assistant engineer, says the reports allowed the department to catch trends developing in accidents and take steps necessary to improve road conditions.

MORE WORK
Since 1966 there has been no central agency which provides the figures. The county must now call each Ontario Provincial Police detachment and police department for information. Police filing systems make it difficult to obtain intersection-by-intersection information without extensive clerical work.
