#### Community Centre \$2,000,000

MILTON—Architects have estimated the cost of the proposed recreation centre and arena complex at \$2,000,000. Dave Brush, chairman of the Milton Community Service Clubs told Milton council last week. The clubs had been expecting a cost of about \$1,000,000. The project would include a 76,000 square foot complex containing a 2,000 seat arena, multi-purpose meeting rooms, gymnasium, community hall, indoor pool, and maintenance rooms. A soccer field and ball park are also being considered in the same complex.

#### Call for By-Pass Start

BRAMPTON—A resolution from the Peel roads committee reaffirming its previous position that reconstruction of Heart Lake Road and Sideroad 10 be started immediately for use as a temporary Brampton truck bypass was approved by county council Thursday. "The first proposal of the department was for approximately \$150,000 and just involved a double lane reconstruction of Heart Lake Road and Sideroad 10", said Brampton mayor Jim Archdekin. "The new proposal is for construction of four lanes on these roads at a cost of more than a million dollars."

#### Fifty Jobs Lost

OAKVILLE—An Oakville company sold four years ago to American interests will be closed leaving 50 employees without jobs. Climatrol Air Colds is shutting down as part of a marketing reorganization being carried out by its parent company Fedder World Trade Corp. The Oakville plant makes air conditioning equipment. Notice was given all employees this week, but first layoffs will not take place until mid-January. The company is looking into the possibility of contracting some of its manufacturing in Canada.

## Says Venture Story Did Not Offer False Hopes

Dear Mr. Editor:  
I would like to comment on last week's mail bag letter from Councillor Jaon Smith at which time she accused the Georgetown Herald of not printing the true facts regarding the proposed relocation to Georgetown of Venture Metalcrafts Limited, and also myself of not presenting the true facts.  
Firstly: I have no contract with Venture Metals to build their new building or any promises that I will get one. I was asked by the president of Venture Metals if I could help him to locate a piece of property in the Metro area for the relocation of his plant, it was at this time that I suggested he should take a look at land in Georgetown.  
Mr. Shepherd came to Georgetown went to the municipal

building and was shown the land by a member of the Industrial Commission.  
Approximately three weeks later I asked Mr. Shepherd if he had heard anything from the town of Georgetown regarding the land and he replied that he had not, it was at this time as a taxpayer in Georgetown that I decided to find out if Georgetown was interested in new industry or not.  
Secondly: I did not make promises to the Committee of Council as suggested in Councillor Smith's letter. I stated the facts as presented to me by the president of Venture Metalcraft Limited, and these facts were printed correctly in the Georgetown Herald.
