TOM HICKS
A new addition to the Georgetown Raider defense this season is Tom Hicks, who hails from Bramalea. He stands 5'11" and weighs 200 lbs., and has gained a reputation in his few weeks here for his ability to carry the puck out of his own zone. He wears No. 6. Hicks has Junior B experience with Weston and played some Senior A brand hockey with Barrie, before coming to the Raiders. He is 25 years old and a Northern Electric office employee.



PAUL ROBINSON
A Georgetown resident, Paul Robinson is one of the teams top scoring threats and a potential candidate for league scoring honours.
