**Doctor Tells Zeta Phi**

## Insecure Turn to Drugs With Disastrous Results

The hostess for the November 8th meeting of Zeta Phi Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi was Mrs. Les Anne Ogden.

The program entitled "Environment, Health, Work and Play" was presented by Mrs. Pauline Hughes and Mrs. Lois Rogers. Mrs. Hughes introduced their program by putting forth the theory that good environment, health, work and play are the components of a true sense of well-being.

She then suggested that although all people seek a feeling of well-being, there are those unfortunate individuals who settle for an unreal and temporary sense of well-being through the use and abuse of drugs. To elaborate on this subject more fully, Mrs. Hughes had invited Dr. Boyd Hoddinott to speak to the Chapter.

**THREATENS ALL**  
Dr. Hoddinott has acquainted himself with a thorough knowledge of the problem of the abuse of drugs. He described the various types of drugs used today from alcohol to heroine.

On the subject of cigarette smoking, he explained that the addict abuses only himself, but the user of alcohol or hallucinatory drugs threatens all of society. This was illustrated by the statistic that 50 percent of all motor vehicle accidents are caused by drivers who have consumed alcohol.

**TURN TO CRIME**  
The drug user finds his habit an expensive one and usually is forced to turn to crime to support it.

Dr. Hoddinott had brought with him two films: "The Curious Habits of Man and Drugs" and the "Nervous System," depicting the deadly effects drugs do have on the nervous system. Hallucinatory drugs such as LSD actually distort images and the user sees the world in an unreal way. He feels a sense of capability which is not really existent, an example is the frequently heard reports of LSD users who believe they can fly when unfortunately they meet reality at the bottom.

LSD users can end up a psychotic or with permanent brain damage.

**HARDER DRUGS**  
Marijuana is a milder hallucinogen but the great danger is that it leads to the use of harder drugs.

Another drug, Amphetamines, stimulate the senses and so overwork the body that it increases the signals the body normally sends to the brain to the point that the brain becomes confused and psychoses follows.

Heroin, the most deadly of all, is an expensive habit and once in its clutches the user is on a downward path to destruction.

Alcohol, which many people think of as a stimulant, is actually a depressant.

**INSECURE**  
Dr. Hoddinott stressed the fact that the state of mind of the user at the time he takes the drug often determines the outcome of his indulgence. Unfortunately, the very people who feel the need for this temporary sense of well-being are insecure individuals to begin with and the final outcome for them is usually disastrous.

Following the discussion, Mrs. Lois Rogers thanked Dr. Hoddinott and presented him with a token of appreciation.

## Real Estate Sales In Halton Are High

Real Estate sales in Halton County should reach a record this year, according to a survey by A. E. LePage Limited, Realtor.

A regular monthly survey of Registry Office figures shows that the total dollar value of real estate sales in the Halton County area was \$21,534,376 for 639 sales in September this year compared to \$13,631,303 for 444 transactions in September last year. This is an increase of 73 per cent.

The cumulative four-month volume of sales (June, July, August and September) is \$81,772,948 for 2,309 units sold this year compared to \$57,397,909 for 1,738 units sold in the corresponding four-month period of 1970.

**WILL INCREASE**  
David N. Sensi, senior vice-president and manager of the Oakville Office of A. E. LePage Limited, estimates that Halton County real estate sales, spurred by a backlog of demand and increased

home building, will increase at least 15 per cent this year. In addition to other regular surveys, A. E. LePage Limited releases this detailed monthly study of the real estate market in Halton County. The report covers Acton, Burlington, Esquesing, Georgetown, Milton, Nassagaweya

and Oakville. The figures, which usually lag 30 to 60 days behind actual contract date of purchase and sale, are gathered from the Registry Office and compiled by A. E. LePage Limited. The survey covers every registered real estate sale in the Halton County area.
