# Don Jarvie Receives Award At Tri-County Annual Dinner

Immediate past president Don Jarvie of Georgetown is this year's Tri-County Honor Award recipient. Jarvie received the huge Jim Brockle Memorial Trophy, which accompanies the award, at Friday night's annual President's Dinner in the Milton Legion.

A member of Georgetown's 1952 P.M.H.A. Juvenile "C" championship team, Jarvie has since served the Tri-County league and minor hockey in almost every capacity as a coach, manager, referee and executive member. More recently he has been Tri-County juvenile convener and chairman of the league's referees' committee.

In his acceptance speech, Jarvie paid tribute to former honor award winner Fred Hammond, who he said in-

## Count Bear Noses From an Airplane

An aerial count of polar bear along the Hudson Bay and James Bay shores was made by department of lands and forests Sioux Lookout District staff during the last week of August and the second week of October.

Only 96 bears, the lowest numbers recorded during August surveys since 1966, were seen during the first survey which covered an area from Anabusko Island in Manitoba to Hook Point in James Bay. A small island which normally had a population of 15 to 20 bears, only yielded one this year.

A reason for the shortage was a ring of 3 to 4 inch thick pack ice around the island that had blown in from the sea and likely acted as a barrier.

Bear distribution was similar to that of other years with major concentrations at the Pen Islands and Cape Henrietta Maria. A result of good weather, experienced all during the flight, was the sighting of about 100 walrus on one island.

**HARD TO SEE**  
Weather may have also played a part in the lower than normal October census when bears stayed in the pits. With snow on the ground they were extremely hard to see unless they moved. But 85 bears were observed in spite of this. Cubs comprised about 8 per cent of the animals; comparable to previous years.

The present movement of bears from Churchill to the Kaskamatta River, 40 miles from Ontario, may result in a change in the distribution next year. J. C. Williamson, a Sioux Lookout District biologist, believes.
