

Expect Wednesday Opening for Esquesing's 10th Line Bridge



Roger McEachern Construction is building 10th Line Bridge.

Esquesing road superintendent Bud Snow is still calling for a December 15 opening for the new 10th Line bridge.

The \$37,000 bridge, constructed by Roger McEachern Construction, of Mount Forest, uses girders 103' long and 35 tons each in weight. The actual bridge span is 90'. The deck and side rails are being finished at present.

The old bridge, which made a spectacular sight when being moved along the road, was cut up on the spot, and sold for scrap.

Two cranes, one with 100 ton capacity, and one with 45 ton capacity, were used to swing the girders into place.

Last week one of the cranes toppled over on its side when it was travelling on the temporary river crossing, presenting the workers with a mammoth job of righting it.

Arthur Barnett Was District Businessman

A businessman in Brampton and Huttonville before retiring, Arthur Vale Barnett, 65, died at his home, 10 Cleaveholm Drive December 2.

Mr. Barnett operated a Brampton bakeshop, later a fruit farm at Huttonville and then was in the butter and egg grading business with his son Stanley.

After retiring, he moved to Norval and later to Georgetown. Born at Wath, Yorkshire, he was the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Barnett. He lived at Harrogate until coming to Canada in 1920.

In World War I he served with the British Navy with HMS Neptune.

He was a member of the Anglican Church and a former warden at St. Paul's Church, Norval.

He leaves his wife, Mary Ann Sutch, whom he married in 1909, a son, Stanley of Huttonville and daughter, Mable, Mrs. Clara Leydens of Welland; 6 grandchildren, Mrs. Elsie Kerner, Mrs. Lynda Rogers and Mrs. Shirley Evans, Welland, Mrs. Peggy Tyerman, Belleville, Pat Barnett and Mrs. Helen Cordingley, Huttonville; and great-grandchildren, Johnny and Donald Tyerman, Belleville, Barbara and Eddie Evans, Toronto, Stavis, Ellie and Bobby Barnett, Huttonville, Mark and Nicky Bernier, Welland, Jimmy and William Hunter, Brampton, Tom, Jamie and Janie Cordingley, Huttonville, Jamie Rogers, Welland and David Rogers, Belleville.
