As Sub-Division 12 representative on the F.W.I.O. Provincial Board, Mrs. George Henderson reported on the Board meeting held the previous week in Toronto. Outlining the various reports, a picture was given of the vast amount of money raised and other aid provided to help people help themselves, to be better homemakers, to develop their talents and leadership qualities, and then go out and use these abilities in the community and for those who are our neighbours across the seas.

From last year there was an overall increase in donations of \$11,344.31; however contributions to Women's Institute projects were down by \$5,249.21 while cash to other organizations had increased by \$10,407.08 compared to six years ago.

SPECIAL PROJECTS
Several special 75th Anniversary W.I. projects have now been completed in honour of the founding of the Women's Institutes in 1897. A donation of \$50,000.00 has been raised by Institute members all over the province toward the expansion of MacDonald Institute at the University of Guelph. Also completed is the purchase fund for the Erland Lee Homestead at Stoney Creek. Mr. Erland Lee

Two special 75th Anniversary banquets will be held, one at the Royal York Hotel in Toronto on February 12, when each branch in Ontario is entitled to send one representative, with about 1400 people expected to attend.

Mrs. Farquharson of England, newly-elected president of the Associated Countrywomen of the World will be the guest speaker, and will also speak at a banquet on February 19, the actual founding date, at Stoney Creek, where the Women's Institute, now grown to a six and a half million-member organization all over the world, first began 75 years ago.

Attitude that Stopped CSG Should Reroute Hydro Line

Dear Sir:
I am sure the residents of the Georgetown area were in full agreement with the decision taken by Ontario's Minister of Mines, Mr. Bernier, when he announced that there should be no gravel pit operations in the Terra Cotta district, and so cancelled a permit once granted to Consolidated Sand and Gravel. All those who look to this beautiful area for recreation, be it hiking on the Bruce Trail, trout fishing or picnicking in the Conservation Park or just driving the country roads to watch the progression of the seasons must surely echo Mr. Bernier's statement that "no area is of greater importance to all the people of southern Ontario than the Terra Cotta area."

Having established this attitude on the part of many agencies of the Provincial Government as well as local government as well as local consideration" how can we now accept the most recent threat to its aesthetic value.

Ontario Hydro unveiled its plans on November 30th to run high voltage lines supported by standards 10 stories high and three abreast across the same part of the Niagara Escarpment.

Everyone concedes that this growing Province needs hydro but surely the place for such lines is in the industrial corridor, or through land that is strictly agricultural. Farmers on the whole are agreeable to selling acreage at a good price for such a purpose and leasing it back at a dollar an acre.

It is my belief that Hydro should not be permitted arbitrarily to draw a line on a map from point A, a nuclear power plant in Pickering to point B, another at Nanticoke on Lake Erie and thus despoil a scenic area still remaining, and within easy access to people of our crowded and polluted cities.

Possibly we can prevent this folly by writing to our Premier who has promised to put the quality of life for the people of Ontario ahead of considerations of money and convenience.

Mobile Eye Care Van Soon Making its Rounds

A mobile eye care van, the second of its kind in Canada, will soon make its rounds throughout Ontario.

"The van is designed to conduct eye examinations and to test for eye diseases," says Medical Director of the project, Dr. W. S. Hunter. "It will be just like an ophthalmologist's office, except on wheels," he continues. As well, there will be equipment for performing minor eye surgery on an emergency basis.

Financed by a \$75,000 grant from the Physicians Services Incorporated Foundation, the mobile unit is considered to be a modern approach to the prevention of blindness.

WEEKLY BASIS
"The van will visit communities usually on a weekly basis," says Dr. Hunter. "In each area, we would like the staff of the van, a medical eye doctor and a nurse, trained in eye care, to work with local general practitioners, public health units, and Lions Clubs to co-ordinate the eye care program."

Dr. Hunter explains that application was made to PSI, a granting agency, which was incorporated by the physicians of Ontario to utilize the reserves remaining after PSI retired from the health insurance field. Their \$75,000 grant covers the purchase of the van and its equipment, operating costs, and the provision of salaries for the van staff, for one year.

"We are pleased," says Dr. D. W. Keenleyside, PSI President, "to be able to provide The Canadian National Institute for the Blind, with funds for its service program which will benefit the citizens of Ontario."

1,000 PEOPLE
Since May, the first mobile eye care unit has been in service in Newfoundland. During this time, 4000 people have had eye examinations. In the first week of operation, the van travelled 100 miles inland from St. John's and 600 people were examined by Dr. E. Shenken, Medical Coordinator for that van. He found three cases of glaucoma, a disturbance of the optic nerve associated with increased pressure inside the eyeball. If neglected this disease can lead to blindness. The first van was financed by the Lions Club of Weston, Ontario and equipped by the CNIB.

A special committee of the Ontario Medical Association will assist in the planning of Ontario's mobile eye care program and will decide on the size of the new van and the equipment that will be needed. The van will be ready to roll by the summer of '72.
