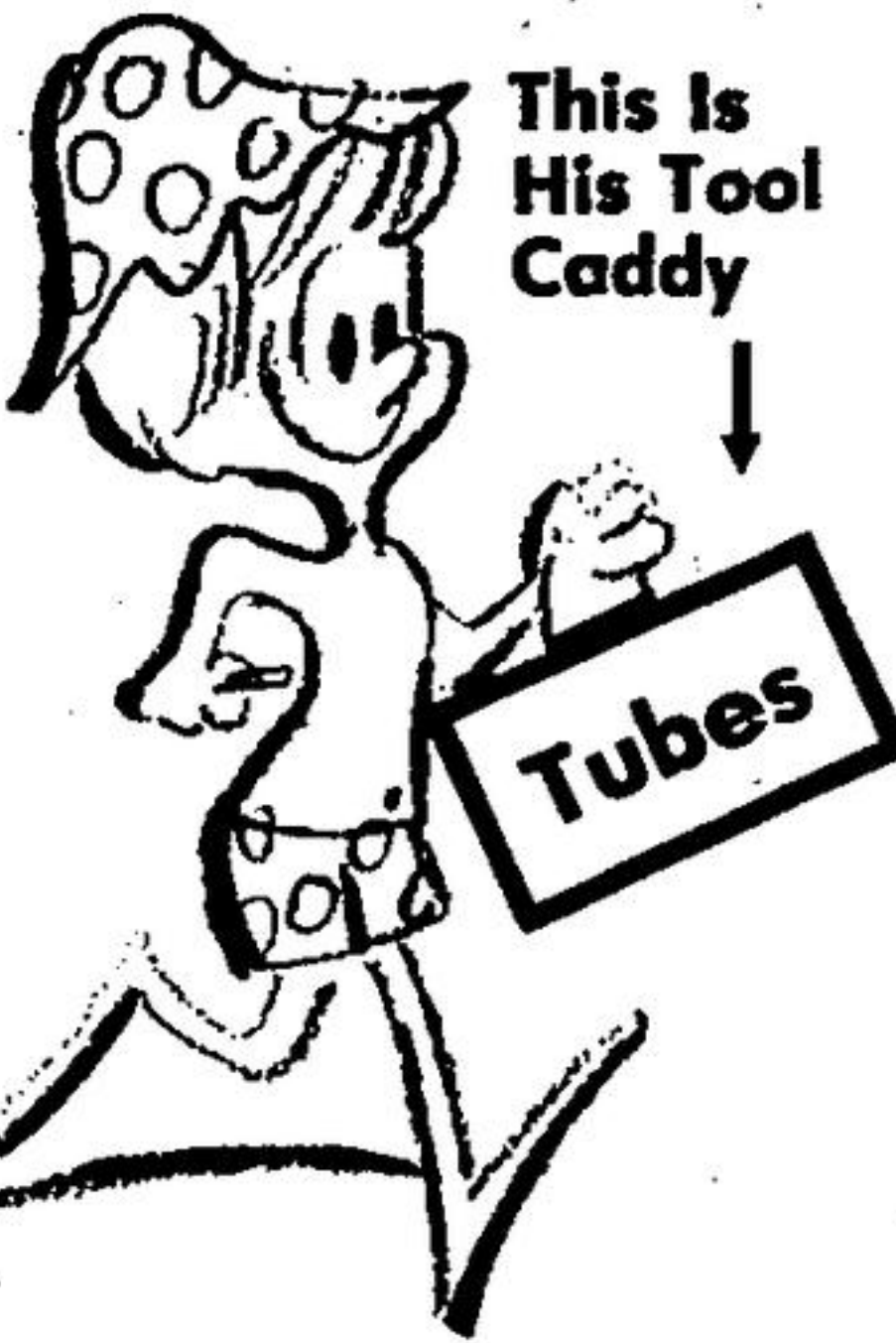
Stewarttown
