

1.38 Acres if Venture Builds within a Year

A purchase offer for 2.7 acres of town-owned land in Georgetown's industrial park by a Weston firm, was countered Monday with an offer by council to sell half the land.

Council told Venture Metalcraft that it would sell 1.38 acres at a price of \$1,000 an acre with the stipulation that a 12,000 square foot factory would be built and in operation within 12 months.

If this consideration were not met, the land, and anything on it, would revert to the town for \$1,000. An option is included in the town's offer.

The balance of the land which Venture wants would be reserved for two years, and also sold at \$1,000 an acre if the firm wished to build an extra 12,000 square feet.

DISPUTE
A town resident, Albert Tennant, told council at a committee meeting a few weeks ago, that the factory would probably employ between 60 to 65 people when fully built.

This was disputed in a mail bag letter to The Herald the next week from Cr. Joan Smith, who is also a member of the Industrial Commission.

Mrs. Smith claimed The Herald news article had implied the firm would be offering 60-65 jobs, that she had checked and would only be offering 10. She said she had told this to a Herald reporter, but only the "builder's promises" had been printed. She charged that it was irresponsible of The Herald to offer false hopes.

THE FACTS
A letter from Mr. Tennant in last week's Herald took Mrs. Smith to task for her letter.

Mr. Tennant said he had stated the facts - that an initial staff of 10 would grow to 60-65 when the plant fully expanded - and that the facts were correctly stated in The Herald's news columns.

He said he has no contract with Venture to build their plant, and had been asked by the firm's president to help locate a property in the Metro area for relocation of his plant, and he had suggested Georgetown.

SOME RISK
Mrs. Smith, in her letter, said Venture is "a very small firm, and there is some risk for both themselves and the town if they relocate in Georgetown."

Her president had told her, she said, that like most small businesses, they hope to expand someday, but they also hope to automate as much as possible. She said she was told they don't wish to get too large, as their business is mostly custom work.

Not All Opposed To Plan

Not all the community representatives who spoke at last Tuesday's meeting on the proposed Ontario Hydro line were opposed to the proposal.

Mrs. Ida Holder told the group that her family has farmed in the area for five generations.

"We have to consider the welfare of many. Hydro needs the land and we need the hydro."

"We are willing to negotiate with hydro for a northern route. The sooner they come the better. We are not willing to pay the added cost of zigzagging the line. The feelings expressed against the line are only the feelings of part of the meeting."

The crowd responded with a hearty round of applause.

After the meeting she said the line runs through her dairy farm and that they would lease it back from hydro to continue farming.

Cliff Moon was booed and

NORTH HALTON REPORT

The week ending November 27 saw officers of the Ontario Provincial Police stationed at North Halton Detachment work a total of 960½ hours and patrol 8,841 miles on area roads. There were 66 drivers summoned to appear in Court for traffic violations and an additional 38 drivers received warnings. Proceedings in Halton Provincial Court resulted in 187 convictions being registered.

General occurrences which required investigation numbered 50. Included in these investigations were: 3 thefts, 3 break and enters, 4 damage to property complaints, 3 vehicles recovered for other police departments and 3 persons reported missing and later located. Two premises were found insecure by officers on

patrol and 1 person was charged with assault causing bodily harm.

Investigation is continuing into a fire at Norval which injured one man and caused an estimated \$45,000.00 damage.

Twenty collisions were investigated this week involving 28 vehicles. Damage was estimated to total \$3,200.00. Five persons were injured in 4 of these collisions with the other collisions resulting in property damage only. Nine persons have been summoned to appear in Court as a result of being involved in these collisions. Further charges are pending following further investigation. The causes of these collisions are: inattentive driving, fail to yield, unsafe lane change and follow too closely.

In Research Project

No Breakfast for Some School Kids

More than 2,000 students in Halton County will go to school without breakfast sometime in the near future as part of a medical research project.

The volunteer students won't eat breakfast so they can give a blood sample to a research team from the Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto which is trying to establish whether hardening of the arteries is hereditary.

CHOLESTEROL
The researchers are surveying blood cholesterol levels looking for an early treatment for hardening of the arteries.

Where youngsters have a high cholesterol level, their parents will be notified and they will receive advice from the hospital.

The research team will also be looking at the effect of diet and exercise on arteriosclerosis, (hardening of the arteries) among the students between the ages of five and 18.

CROSS-SECTION
Halton was chosen for the test because of its varied cross-section of urban and rural students and different economical and social areas.

Irene Armstrong, superintendent of special services with Halton Board of Education said parents would have to consent before a student could take part in the experiment.
