Food for Deer Food for Thought

The following will enlighten one as to the utility of winter deer feeding, that is with their natural food.
Apparently each day a deer requires about four pounds of food per 100 lbs of its own weight. A mountain sapling has approximately half a pound of deer food on its branches. So eight saplings should be cut each day for each deer. The usual winter is approximately 100 days long, 800 saplings for each deer are needed each winter.
If 1000 deer were fed, 800,000 saplings would have to be felled, and as we know, the saplings are the future of the forests. So it's food for thought.

WINTER BIRD FEEDING
Once again winter is with us and birds of all species have a hard time finding food.
Fancy bird feeding stations are ok but any large flat surface will do if it is erected four or five feet above ground.
If the feed is scattered on the snow or crust it should be away from hedges or any thick cover that cats can pounce or spring from.

Plastic milk jugs with a large section cut out of one side make good feeding stations. Some tin foil or plastic can be tied over the top.
Mixed feed especially for winter feeding can be bought at large stores. Sunflower seeds which some birds like can be had in the bulk, and don't forget the uncooked peanuts for the blue jays and squirrels, they love them. It's fun to watch the jays hide them and then see the squirrels steal them.

REWARDING
The most rewarding sight of all is when the cardinals come to feed. On a dull, dreary, depressing winter's day a person gets a lift when he gazes out the

window and sees his feathered friends, who were kind and brave enough to stay and share our winter and brighten up our day.
It's surprising how much feed can be purchased for less than six dollars, especially in the bulk. And I will grant you, that the enjoyment one gets is worth 10 times the price of the feed. So... let's go for the birds.
Christmas, once again, will soon be here. I do hope everyone receives a nice gift to go with their favourite sport.
