

Robinson Scores Six as Raiders Bury Fort Erie

Paul Robinson fired six goals and helped on two others to lead the Georgetown Raider charge that flattened Fort Erie 15-3 here Friday night.

Raiders erupted for 11 goals in the second period in their best offensive effort this season. Robinson had five of the second period goals, and also notched the second of Raiders two third period goals.

Al Stitt, Steve Blundy, and Junior Tibbetts each scored twice and Dennis Adams, Terry Cook and Lance Doucette once.

Al Stitt also had five assists.

Fort Erie's marksmen were Musselman, Coupe and Bremner.

Though tested only 27 times, new Raider netminder Keith Pallett turned in another outstanding game between the pipes. At the other end, Fort Erie's Dave Koehler still managed to turn aside 46 Raider shots.

Steve Blundy took a Bill Curie pass and converted it into Raiders first goal with five and a half minutes gone. Musselman from Coupe and Ceato erased the lead, but Raiders regained it on Tibbetts' marker from Stitt and Terry Holmes. Bob Coupe deked out a second time with the same two mates assisting.

The second period deluge started after two minutes of play when Robinson scored the first of his half dozen from Tibbetts and Stitt. Stitt made it 4-2 seconds later from Holmes, and the pattern continued with Georgetown driving another nail in the

Fort an average of about every minute and a half.

Blundy from Adams and newcomer Al Rochon; Robinson from Stitt and Tibbetts; Robinson sans aid; again from Tibbetts and Stitt; again from Terry Cook; Stitt from Robinson and Cotton; Adams from Rochon; Cook from Doucette; and Doucette from Ron Lane and Cook all were winners in the second period shooting gallery.

Robinson and Rochon assisted on Tibbetts' third period goal, and Robinson notched his sixth from Stitt and Tibbetts, the 10th goal for that line on the night, half way through the third.

Harry Bremner upped Fort Erie's output to three from Fred Meredith with less than three minutes to go.

Six Raiders served minor penalties, but just one visitor, Bruce Waters, served penalty time.

Georgetown should have saved some of their production for Sunday night when they went into the Welland arena and took a 6-1 thumping.

Paul Robinson was the only Raider able to beat the Welland jinx.

Tomorrow night is another Booster Ticket night at the Georgetown Memorial Arena with Minor Hockey Support Group selling tickets in advance.
