A sub-committee of the board's ad hoc committee on priorities and expenditures has recommended the study. Judy Alexander, school trustee was chairman of the educational finance sub-committee that made the recommendation. She said "the committee feels that the true cost of absenteeism is significantly higher than the expense shown in our budget...and absenteeism may be related to staff morale". The educational finance committee also reported that there is some confusion among principals and department heads concerning budget procedures.

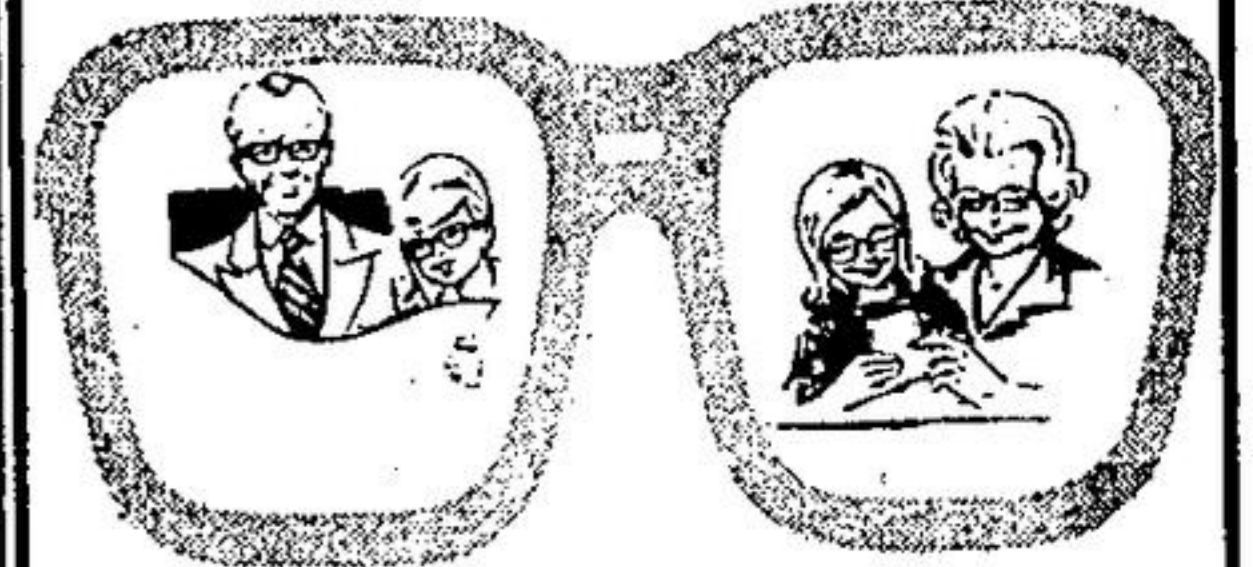

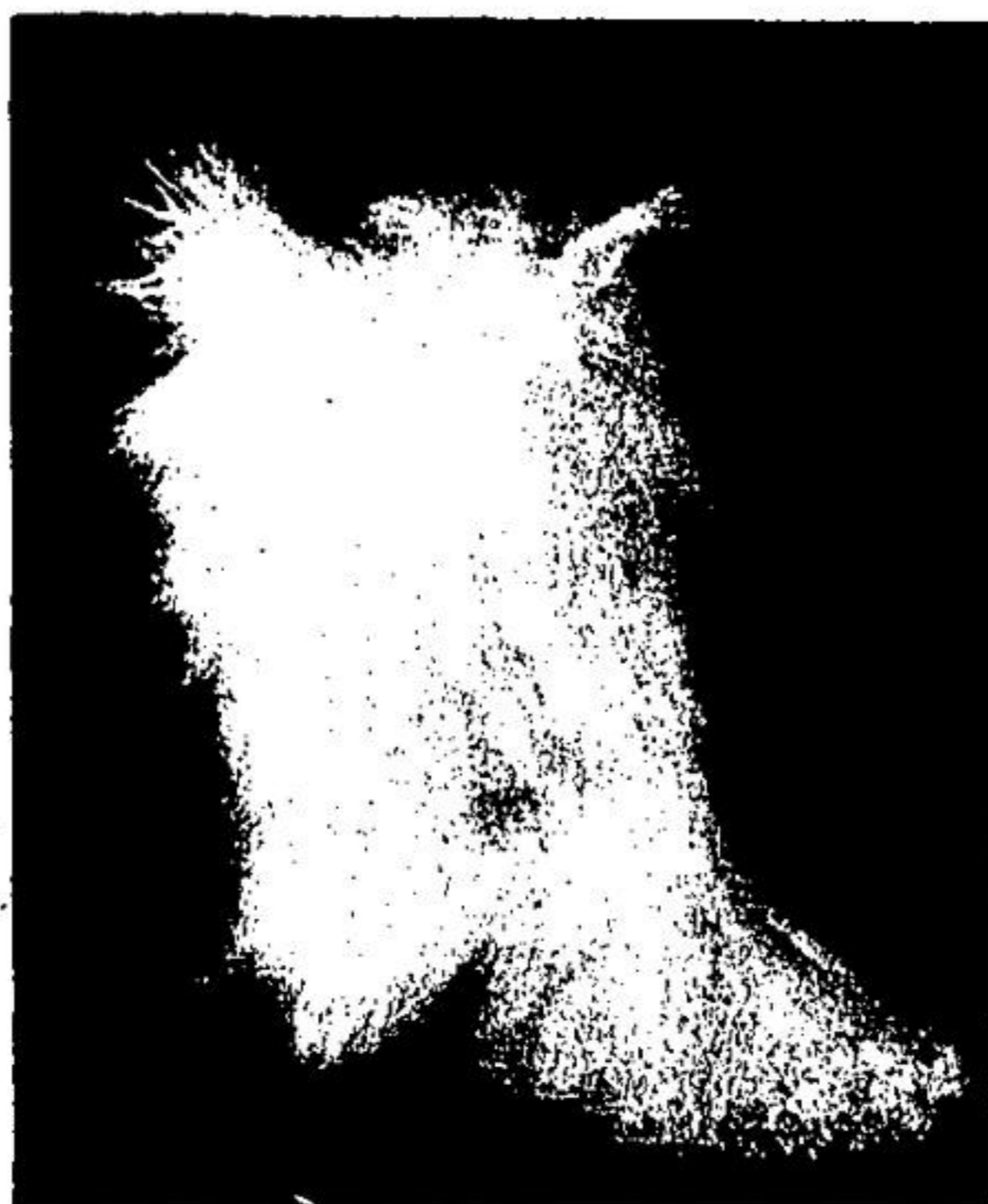
