Renewed **Permits**

Reeve Tom Hill told Esquesing council Monday afternoon that they should ask the Department of Mines and Northern Affairs what conditions the quarries have to meet to have their permits renewed.

Quarries Get

The reeve claimed he knew of pits where no rehabilitation had been done, "and probably never will be". He made the comments after a letter from the Dept. of Mines and Northern Affairs was read listing quarries in the township whose permits had been renewed till April 30, 1972. The quarries were: J. C. Duff,

lot 23, Con. 5; Hugh Campbell, lot 23 Con. 9: Century Quarries, lot 22, Con. 5; C. G. Bishop, lot 23, Con. 10; Armstrong Holdings, lot 23, Con. 10; Corners Sandstone Quarries, lot 28, Con. 10; Harvey Norton, lot 26, Con. 9; Indusmin Ltd. lot 23, and 24, Con. 4; Garvin Quarries, lot 29, Con. 10; Colossal Developments lot 26-27, Con. 7: Muldoon Holdings, lot 25, Con. 8.

Clerk Delmar French sald the letter stated the operation and rehabilitation of the quarry must be in accordance with an approved site plan, and the site plan must meet with the requirement of the Planning Act and the O.W.R.C.

Growers Seek To Shrink Assessment

Some fruit and vegetable growers stand to have their farm assessements reduced from \$1,200 per acre to about \$100 per acre on appeals of 1971 assessment hikes, Harold Middlebrook of the Halton Federation of Agriculture told the county council's finance committee last Wednesday.

In his monthly report to the committee, Middlebrook said the appeal process is slow in Oakville and Esquesing Township with some progress in Burlington.

The Federation is attempting to have its lawyer and municipal solicitors for Oakville and Esquesing jointly sign consent forms to forward to the Ontario Municipal Board for arranging a hearing date.


