Let's Look At the Infancy Gospel"

Since we are in the Christmas season let's look at the sections in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke (chapters 1 and 2 of each Gospel

which talk about the birth and infancy of Jesus. These four chapters are usually referred to as the "Infancy Gospel". There are both striking differences, and yet basic similarities in these chapters. First of all the differences - they are of place, time and content. While Matthew suggests that Joseph and Mary lived in Bethlehem, Luke writes that Jesus was only born there because of the census. And while the geographical stress in Matthew's Gospel is on Bethlehem, in Luke's Gospel that stress is on

Nazareth. But con a greater difference than that of place, is that of time. For while the events told to us by Matthew would appear to demand a long period of time, perhaps as long as two years (Herod had all the boys up to two years killed), Luke's Gospel implies that the period between the birth of Jesus and the return to Nazareth was

quite short. But the biggest differences of all are those of content. Matthew for instance tells us nothing of all the following events in Luke's account: the Amunciation, the birth (and circumcision) of John the Baptist, the incidents in the Temple (Zechariah, Simeon, Anna), the

Visitation of Mary to Elisabeth. On the other hand, Luke tells us nothing of the following in Mat-thew's account: Joseph wanting to repudiate Mary, the Magi, the flight into and return from Egypt, Herod's massacre of the children.

But there are also some striking similarities in the two accounts. Even although they are handled a little differently in each Gospel. both accounts agree about and stress three things: 1. the birth of Jesus at Bethlehem, 2 the Davidic descent of Jesus, and 3. that Jesus was conceived "of the Holy Spirit". What can we conclude from all this? First of all, the differences indicate that the Evangelists almost certainly used different literary sources here. This is not surprising when we recall that the two Gospels were composed in and for two different (and possibly distant) Christian communities, and that they were only written down about 70 years after the birth of Jesus.

A second, and related, conclusion is this: the three points of agreement listed above would appear to be the essentials of the story, from the historical point of view. A third, and final conclusion is also called for. This is the fact that the primary interest of the Gospel writers in these chapters does not appear to be a biographical one so much as a theological one.

Apart from the three clearly historical affirmations listed above, the differences which we listed suggest this "theological" stress.

Further confirmation for this conclusion is found in the facts that only two of the Evangelists write about the birth and infancy of Jesus, and even in Matthew and Luke there is no real interest shown in "biographical" details, such as the home life of Jesus, his appearance, his education etc.

We might say that the "theological" pre-occupations of Matthew and Luke were three: 1. Jesus was man, born of a woman at a particular time and place; 2. Jesus was also Messiah and Son of God, conceived "of the Holy Spirit"; 3. The fact of Jesus' birth fulfilled the past history of Israel, and was the first step towards his future. mission of suffering and glory.

This last affirmation is made by Matthew and Luke in the Infancy Gospels by means of encompassing the birth and infancy of Jesus in a great deal of Old Testament imagery and atmosphere, as well as narrating episodes about his birth which involved both suffering (pointing to the Cross), and joy (pointing to the resurrection.
