

Georgetown's Skylarks Carry Ontario Colours in National

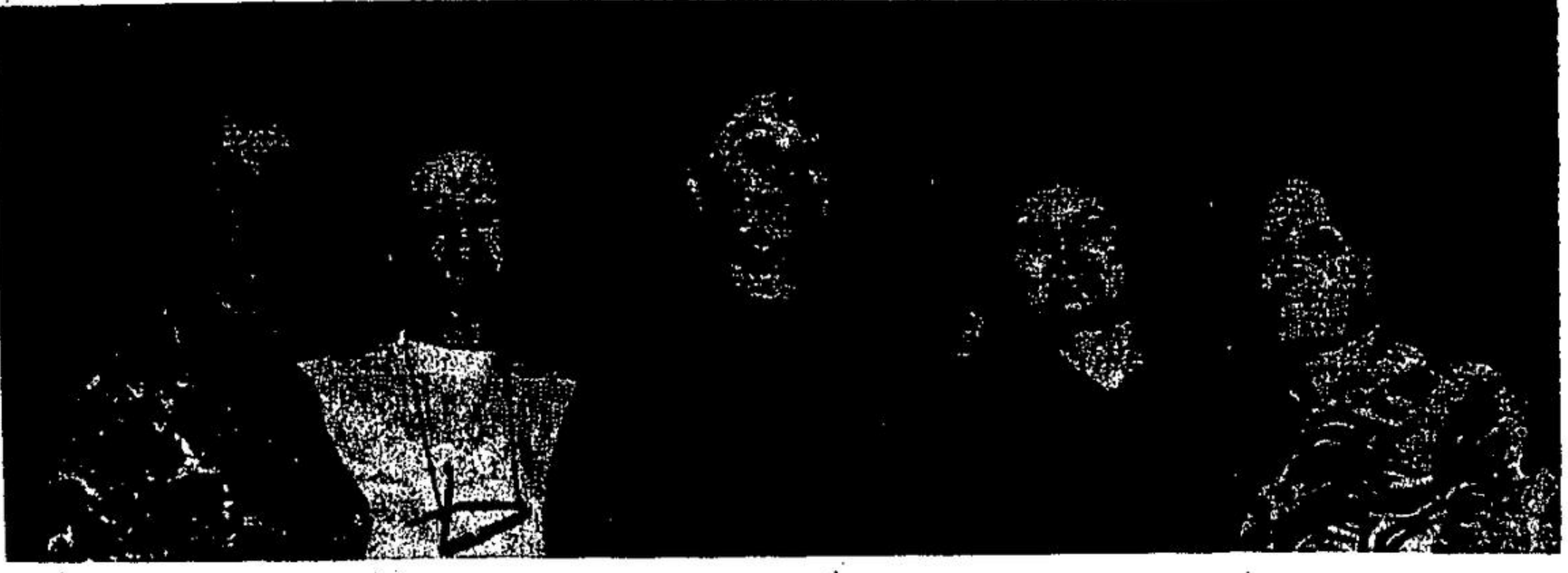
