## Teachers' Chain Letter Knocks High Pay Jobs

Here's a chain letter being sent around Halton schools. The text follows: "This is a chain letter, initially sent to 100 teachers of the Halton County system, chosen at random. If you agree with most of the ideas expressed, please duplicate the entire sheet four or five times and send to other teachers, students, parents, taxpayers, board members. Much is being said about the autonomy of the teacher. You who teach know that such a thing ceased to exist two years ago. You are now manipulated and made to dance like puppets on a string. You have lost virtually all freedom to teach your own subject in your own way, employing such methods as you see fit to best suit your own situation. In order to reverse this state of affairs and at the same time, save the taxpayers millions of dollars over

the years, we suggest that all or most of the following positions be eliminated, and that education be returned to the hands of the educators, that is the principal, his department heads, and his teachers.

1 — The director of education (\$35,000) (salaries are approximate); 2 — Assistant to the director (\$28,000); 3 — Three superintendents of education (\$27,000 each); 4 — Twelve assistant superintendents (\$25,000 each); 5 — Six co-ordinators (\$19,000 each); 6 — Six assistant co-ordinators (\$18,000 each); 7 — Innumerable consultants — one or more for each (23) subject area (\$17,000 each).

The abolition of many of these would automatically reduce the expenses needed to support such

an hierarchy — secretaries, buildings, cleaning services, expense accounts, travelling expenses, etc. etc.

These administrators are attempting to justify their existence by "Economizing" at the expense of the students by eliminating courses in which the enrollment is small. These people are creating neurotic teachers by their incessant harassment in the form of supervision, interference "help", meddling, suggestions, inspections, aims and objectives, visitations, etc. etc.

The assistant superintendents inspect teachers and rate them in subjects which they themselves have never taught, sometimes never studied!

**Dental Director Says**

### Mass Fluoride Use Way of the Future

Dental Director for Halton County Dr. Sam Green told the Halton County Board of Health mass treatment for tooth decay prevention is the thing of the future.

He told the board fluoride clinics and mass brush-ins were being held across the county. He said the brush-ins had good response from grades five to eight and he hoped to extend the treatment to grade four.

Dr. Green indicated fluoride clinics and the brush-ins were good for all of the young people in the schools and said there was no fear of getting too much fluoride. He recommended using both the brush-ins, topical fluoride and fluoridated water.

**UNFLUORIDATED AREAS**  
He suggested fluoride at clinics and fluoride pills were even more urgent for those areas that don't yet have fluoridated water.

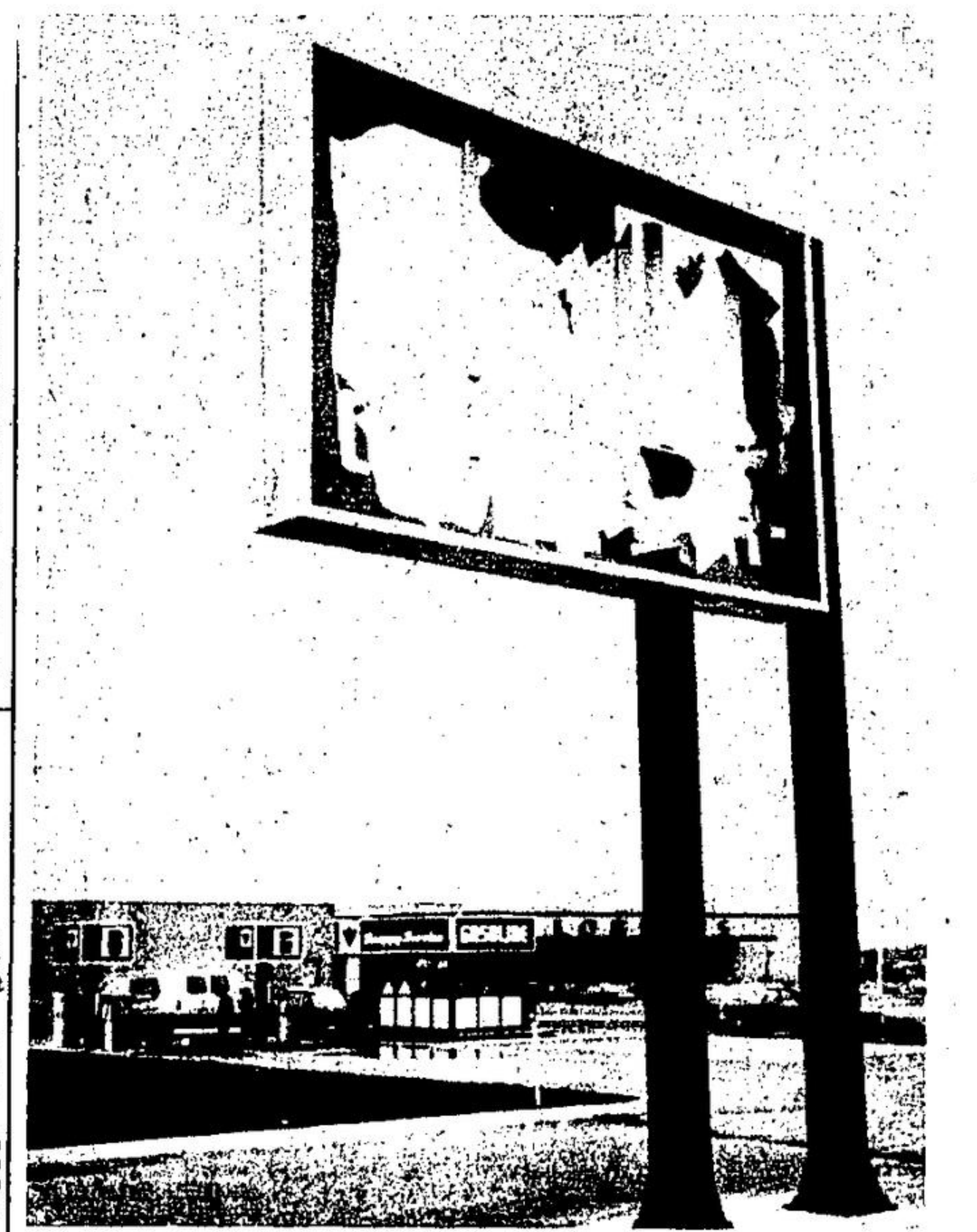
He said parents should take advantage of the free topical fluoride clinics because a private man would charge \$10 to \$15 for the same service.

Decay can be cut by as much as 85 per cent if youngsters use pills, fluoridated water and the topical fluoride method, Dr. Green suggested.

### 500 Cans Of Prem Returned

Dr. J. H. Chamberlain of Georgetown, Halton County's Medical Officer of Health, told the Halton Board of Health that 500 cans of Prem were collected

by local inspectors in the county after visiting 178 establishments. The luncheon meat was recalled by Swift Canadian Co. Ltd. because some batches of it were not properly processed.
