

Norval Garage Fire Victim Out Of Hospital for New Years

Sorry that I have been unable to report the Norval news for about a couple of months. I spent three weeks in Georgetown & District Memorial Hospital for surgery and the remainder of the time recuperating. I have had many readers of this column calling to say how much they have missed the Norval news lately and it is good to know that the column was missed.

My column depends on you and your neighbour letting me know about the activities in the community, so please give me a call when you have some news and I will do my best to keep the column informative and interesting.

While I was in the hospital the garage owned by Mr. N. Lefebvre next to the United Church was completely destroyed by fire and 18 year old Ken Sproule of Georgetown was badly burned in the explosion. Norman Guthrie rushed him to Georgetown Hospital where he was given first aid and transferred by ambulance to Peel Memorial Hospital, Brampton, where he remained in critical condition for some time with severe burns to his face and hands which required plastic surgery.

His condition now is greatly improved and he was released from the hospital on Friday, December 31 in time to celebrate the new year but he will have to return as an outpatient for therapy.

Another event of interest to the community near the end of November was the successful auction sale of furniture, many of the items antiques, of Mr. and Mrs. Hardy Barnhill who have moved to Brampton.

About a week before Christmas old timers of the community were saddened to hear of the death of Donald Russell of New Toronto. Don was a 'Norval boy', having been raised on a farm on the edge of the village where his brother and sister Jim and Margaret Russell still reside.

Sympathy is extended to them, also to his brother John of New Toronto and to his wife, son and daughter, all of New Toronto.

Don was mayor of New Toronto for many years and was a Sr. controller for the Borough of Etobicoke at his death. Interment was in Hillcrest Cemetery, Norval.

All three churches in the village held special Christmas services with the various groups holding Christmas parties.

The choirs from the three churches combined in presenting a Carol Service in the Presbyterian Church on Sunday evening, December 12th.

At Norval United Church the Junior Choir of about 25 members sang Christmas selections at Peel Manor, Brampton, recently and presented the residents with small gifts.

The Sunday School concert was held on Friday evening December 17th with each class presenting skits or songs. The Junior Choir sang several songs and the evening ended with the arrival of Santa Claus and a clown to distribute the gifts from the tree.

The annual Candle Light Service was presented by the combined Senior, Teen and Junior choirs on Sunday evening December 19th.

The Couples Club annual New Year's party with dancing and a buffet lunch held at Stewarttown Hall was the usual successful evening.

St. Paul's Anglican Church Sunday School held their annual birthday party for the Baby Jesus recently with all classes participating. One class presented a gift book to the church to commemorate the 125th anniversary of the church.

A special Christmas eve Communion service was held in the church at which Gordon Fendley played his guitar and sang 'Do You Hear What I Hear?' The choir joined him in singing the chorus.

Union Presbyterian Church Sunday School concert was held on Friday evening December 17 and Norval Presbyterian Church Sunday School concert was held on Monday evening December 20th with each class presenting small skits, songs, recitations, etc. The highlight of both evenings was the arrival of Santa Claus to present the gifts from the tree.

LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

When you are learning to play bridge you will probably be told a lot of rules, starting with "always" and "never". Always cover an honour with an honour.

Never open the bidding without two defensive tricks.

Such rules are fine for a beginner but as you learn more about the game, you will learn that these rules do not always apply. The one I wish to write about this week is — Never give declarer a ruff and a sluff.

I agree with this rule but not with the 'never' in front. It is generally a very poor play to allow declarer to ruff in one hand and discard a loser for the other. However it can also be a very effective play for the defense, provided that declarer has no losers to discard.

Here is just such a hand from the Acton Bridge Club.

South dealt with neither side vulnerable.

Upgrading lead — king of spades. West's overall may seem abit shaky to rubber bridge players but not to duplicate players. East-West are not vulnerable and West does have a few points. Duplicate players will overcall just in case their side can find a part score contact on a sacrifice. Perhaps North should pass but he does have two quick tricks and a singleton so he introduces three clubs.

South temporizes with a bid of three diamonds. This bid is forcing and shows at least one stopper in diamonds. If North has spades stoppers, they could play in no trump. North supports hearts and South carries on to game.

After the opening lead, declarer is quite happy. It looks like three spades losers if the defense cashes them and declarer can claim the balance. However, the defense had other ideas. On the spade king, East signals encouragement by playing the eight. West continues with the ace and then the six of spades.

East won the third round and took stock. A heart return to cut down diamond ruffs did not look

Georgetown Lions put \$4,114 into community work and selected charities last season according to their trust account balance sheet released in a recent issue of Communicate the local club's bulletin.
