

## Weekly Motor Sled Races Start Sunday at Waterfalls

The avid snowmobiler will have a chance to race for cash and trophies every Sunday, starting January 9, at Waterfalls Park and Lodge on the 6th line, near Limehouse.

Warm, cozy surroundings are provided in the newly-built lodge, complete with huge, stone fireplace, and hot food is available for both racers and spectators.

The 13 race meet, including five stock races, five modified races and three ladies races, will be run according to the Ontario Snowmobile Racing Federation Rules, on an oval-banked one third mile track.

Bales of hay around the perimeter of the track offer protection in case of a driver sliding out on the corners. The track will be patrolled by flagmen, carrying walkie-talkies.

**CASH PRIZES**  
A total of \$250 cash, plus trophies donated by many interested dealers, will be up for grabs the first Sunday of racing, which should start shortly after noon.

General admission to the area is one dollar, and the entry fee to the races is three dollars for a stock machine and four for a modified machine.

Welcoming banners have been donated by S.T.P., and start and finish banners by Bosch Spark

Plugs. Park Toyota Motors of R.R.1, Georgetown and Silvercreek Shell have donated trophies, while other sponsors are not yet confirmed.

**BANQUET**  
All competitors must be at least 16 years of age, but anyone under 18 must have the written consent of their parents to race. All entrants must wear helmets, boots, and gloves, and all machines must be licensed.

Martin Prucyk, son of the owner Joe Prucyk, is organizing the event, and plans to have a banquet at the end of the season for drivers who have consistently entered the races, whether or not they were winners.
