Mayor Tells Athletes

Remember the Other Meaning of Champion

"There is another meaning of the word champion", Mayor Bill Smith told an audience of young athletes Wednesday night. "A Champion is a person who devotes himself to a worthy cause or helps those less fortunate."

Mayor Smith was congratulating several dozen bowlers, wrestlers, soccer and hockey players gathered at Georgetown Golf and Country Club to receive recognition for outstanding achievements during 1971.

"On the road to success you will find people who know the value of getting advice", he said. "Henry Ford said success was due to the fact that he was able to employ men better qualified than himself. This is no doubt an exaggeration - no person can be an expert in everything connected with his work, and we can easily see how this is true when we study the elements of success in the field of sports. Very few athletes could ever get to the top

without the good coaching and advice of an intelligent manager or coach."

"It has been said that more prize fights have been won and lost on the quality of the advice given by their seconds than by the skill and ability of the fighter. The fellow who can throw the punch, kick the ball, shoot the puck, usually has to be told what to do at the right time", he said.

"I know that all the athletes here appreciate the time and effort given them by their coaches, the time knowledge and effort that played such a major role in making them champions in their respective fields."

"You know a champion is a person who has earned the title of being the best in a sports contest", he said. "There is also another meaning of the word champion which I feel should be mentioned at this time. A champion is one who devotes

himself to a worthy cause or helps less fortunate as in the expression - championing a cause."

Mayor Smith said he hoped the young guests of honour will continue their efforts to be champions throughout their lives.

"In your schools, churches and homes you learn to be champions of right, honesty, truth and justice. I hope you seek such championships - always and that you will apply the rules of good sportsmanship, determination and the fighting spirit you have shown to become champions in your respective sports to all your activities in the future", he said.

"To say that we are very proud of you doesn't seem enough, but we are just that proud and happy to be associated with so many fine young people, and we hope that all of you will be back again at future award dinners - as champions."

Stewarttown Accident Sends Two to Hospital

An Oakville couple were admitted to hospital and two Georgetown men slightly injured, following an accident on the 7th line south of 15 sideroad at Stewarttown December 27.

The accident involved a '67 Chev driven by Gordon Inglis, 18 Cleaveland Drive, and a '72 Dodge driven by Mrs. Isabelle Watts, of Oakville.

Mrs. Watts suffered a neck injury, and her husband Ronald, back and head injuries, and sore shoulder.

Inglis received slight injuries to his left leg, and a passenger John Henderson, 17 Hewson Crescent, a cut lip.

Damage to both cars was extensive, \$1,200 to the Chev, and \$1,800 to the Dodge.

Earlier that same day, also on the 7th line, this time south of 10 sideroad at Ashgrove, cars driven by Ruth Kilner, Con. 6, Esqueuing, and Jeffrey Johnson, 42 Joyceville Cres., collided.

No-one was injured, but \$250 damage was done to the Kilner car, and \$200 to the Johnson's '68 Dodge.

Crashing through a guard rail and clipping a hydro pole December 26, caused \$1,500 damage to a '70 Pontiac driven by Barry James, 9 William Street, but he escaped with only bumps and bruises.

The accident happened on Maple Avenue, just east of the 7th line, and left three guard posts sheared off.

The 8th line south of 22 sideroad, was the scene of a single car accident, December 23, when William Hayes, 11 Queen Street, Georgetown, lost control of his car, and skidded into the ditch.

His '66 Pontiac received \$800 damage, but he was not injured.
