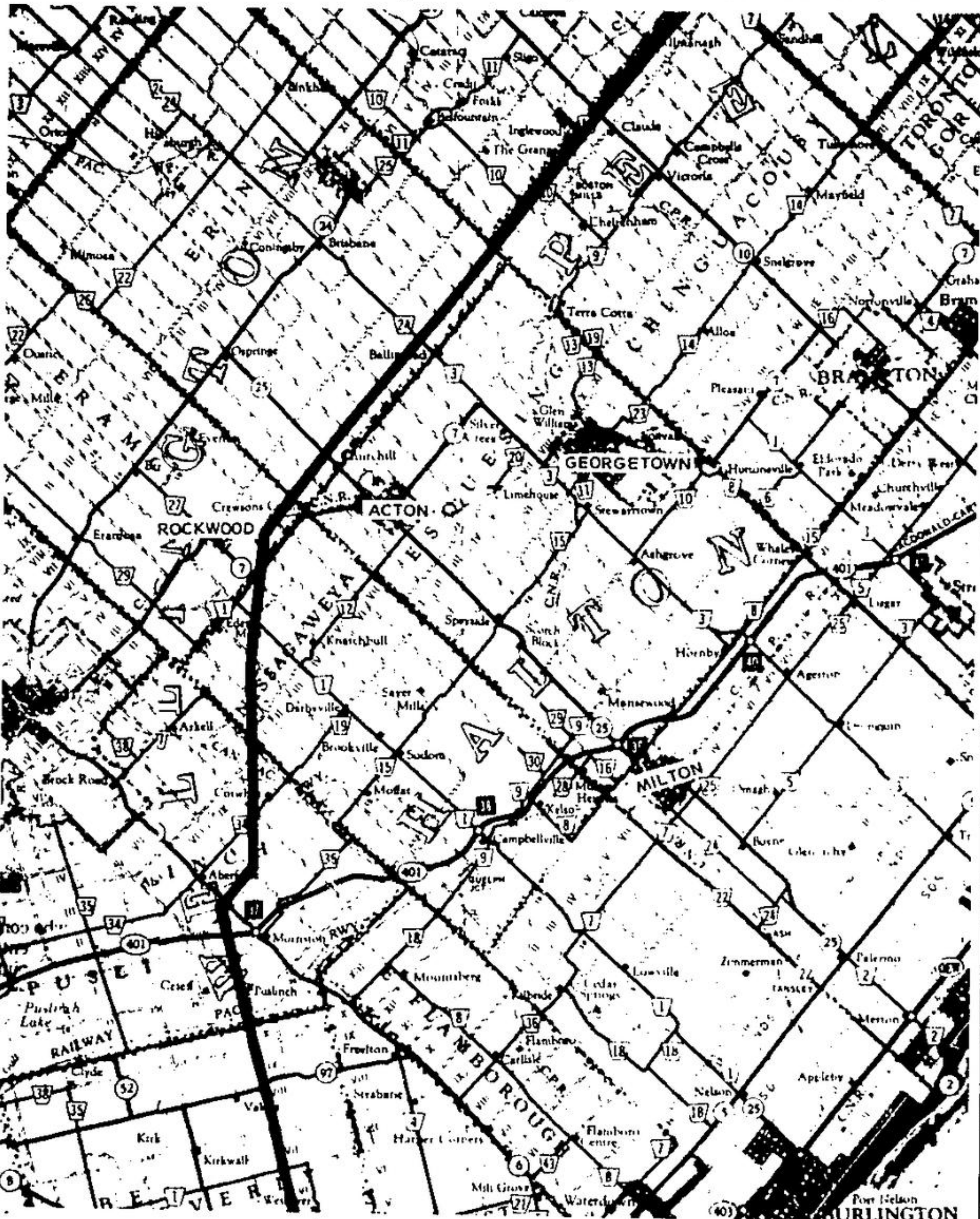


## Here is Where Hydro Proposes Tower Trail

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## 1853 Circuit Rider Had High Praise for Glen

Printed below is an excerpt from an article in the current issue of the Ontario Historical Society Journal dealing with the founding of Albert College, Belleville, under the auspices of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

It indicates the scarcity of money at that time (1853-4), the difficulty in travelling in the days before railroad and ends with some complimentary remarks for the people of Glen Williams, which should be of interest to its present day inhabitants.

The money had to be raised by voluntary subscription and collected by circuit riders. J. Johnson and Samuel Durnett by riding circuit and appealing to the friends of the Methodist Episcopal Church raised \$1,350 by November 26, 1853 and by March 22, 1854, had raised \$12,000.

The actual process of raising the money as told by Johnson is one of sheer heroism and devotion in the face of great difficulty.

**CIRCUIT RIDER'S REPORT**

"My canvas on the Toronto circuit was attended with the severest fatigue on account of the wretched conditions of the roads. The Rev. W. D. Brown accompanied me (or rather I accompanied him for he took the lead) to the houses of the friends. We obtained in all \$500.

"The amount raised on the circuit is less than half of what it should have been if we consider the great wealth of the people for while some gave all their means would allow others gave a small portion, and several of the wealthiest gave nothing at all assigning a proper poverty as the cause.

"I have only to add that although I was everywhere entertained with great kindness by the people of the circuit, yet no locality so officiously aided in the object of my mission as Glen Williams."
